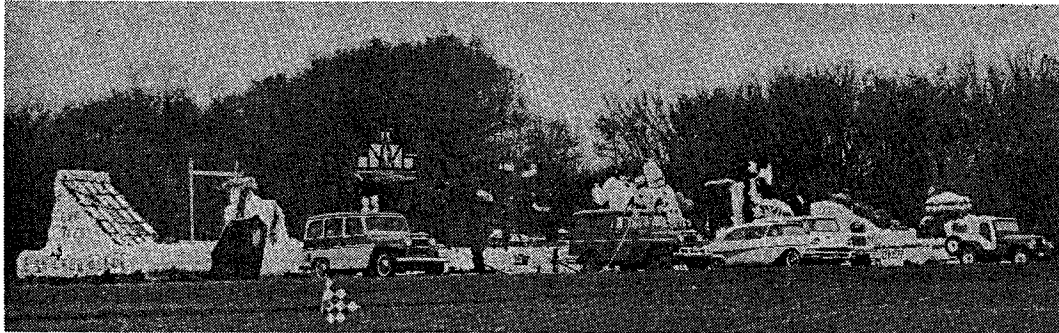

The sophomore class' offering, a giant roller coaster, was the next attraction. Their theme was "We Autumn Roll Them Over."

The peppy frosh-soph cheerleaders preceded the senior float which featured a giant panda and the prize-winning theme, "There'll Be Pandamonium When the Bronco Take the Prize."

All students who sold their individual quota of \$10.00 will receive a free ticket to any movie at the Catlow Theater.

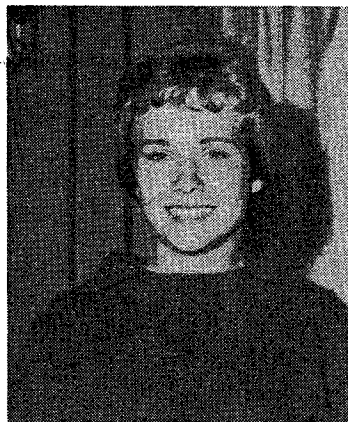
But First... a Word From Denny Then the Long Awaited Moment

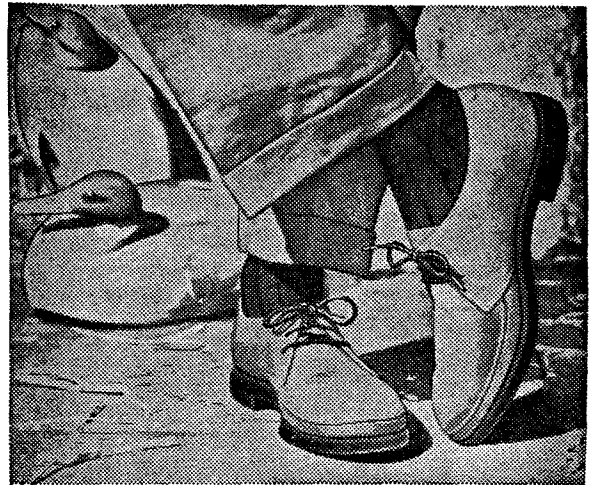

dents at BHS would enjoy reading about some of them. This, then, is the first in a series of articles on Barrington and BHS, 15, 25, and 50 years ago.

50 years ago in the year 1912, the people of Barrington were worrying about the incredible increase in the enrollment of BHS—67 students!—a total of 40% more than the previous year. Obviously, the school was just a mite small to make any attempt at a football team, let alone a Homecoming!

For that Saturday night date, a boy in those days could take his girl to the "moving pictures" for the unheard of price of ten cents. If he were lucky, he could get the family Model A and take her in style. The new 1913 Fords were just coming out in October, and the price of the runabout—the "economy car"—was \$525, while a flashy town car would set Dad back \$800.

25 years ago: At that time, Libertyville was the only conference contender we still play today. The others were Grant, Arlington, Lake Forest, and Niles Center. In comparing the total points we scored in those days to what we've racked up so far this season, it's obvious we've come a long way! In nine years (1927-1936) against Arlington, Barrington scored a total of 42 points, while Arlington came up with 130 points.

15 years ago: "We ought to remember Homecoming Day, 1947, for a long time. It was the grandest this school has ever known. There was no shortage or scarcity of materials; there were no ration stamps, no reminders of war. . . . Those sobering words opened the story of Barrington's Homecoming, 1947.

I wonder what people will be saying about us 50 years from now?

THREE BHS STUDENTS TO APPEAR ON TV QUIZ SHOW

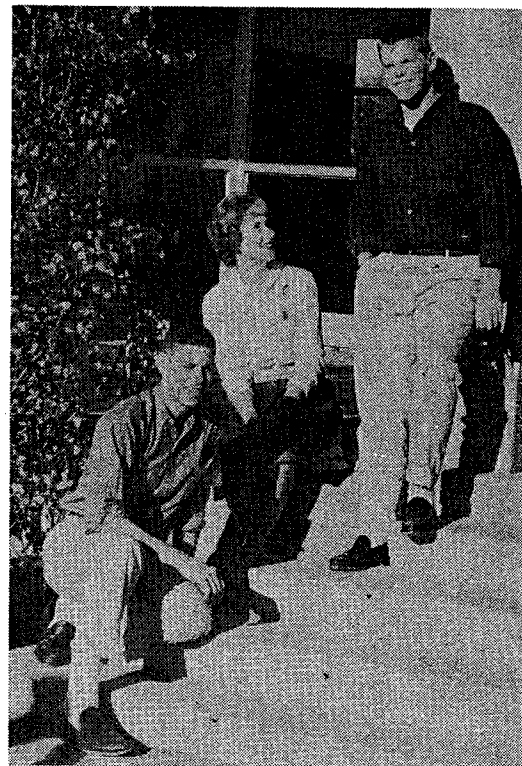

On October 11 fifteen Barrington seniors went to the Merchandise Mart for the selection of the final three who would be on the show and their three alternates. This program is a TV quiz show in which top students in Chicago area high schools compete. Barrington will meet either Niles West or West Leyden on October 27 at the Merchandise Mart.

The winning team on the 27th will meet the other school on the 28th for another contest.

All of the show will be taped and shown on TV in the near future, although the exact date is not known. The topics of competition for the students are English, math, science, history, and general topics.

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BRONCHOS SWAMP ZEE-BEES 27-0

Varsity Records 6th Win

Maintaining the top notch in the North Suburban Conference, the Bronchos knocked down the only team that could have given them some trouble, Zion-Benton, 27-0.

The Zee-Bees could manage only six first downs while the Bronchos gathered 16. Zion ran up a total of 136 yards gained while the Bronchos rolled up 327 yards.

Kim Wood and Bill Potter were the work-horses for the team. Kim carried the ball 18 times for a total of 98 yards and Bill swam over the Zee Bee defense for 139 yards in 17 attempts.

Potter and Wood each tallied once for six points and each added an extra point. Potter scored on a 19-yard sprint while Wood entered the end zone on a 5-yard plunge.

End Charles Mirs picked up a Zion fumble and proceeded to run 50 yards for the score. Steve Holzwart galloped 23 yards for the last touchdown.

Rick Von Albrecht added a point after touchdown to rack up the 27th and final point.

The Bronchos jumped out to a quick 14-0 lead at the end of the first quarter and added an additional six points before the gun at halftime sounded and another score during the fourth quarter to cinch the Bronchos' Homecoming contest.

Broncs Average Six Yards

The Bronchos gained slightly more than 6 yards each time they carried the pigskin. Against Dundee only one week before they had ground out 7.5 yards per try. Against Palatine the Bronchos gained almost 10 yards a try and Libertyville couldn't stop the high-flying Broncs at all as they romped over them for 12 yards an attempt.

During the six games played this season so far the Bronchos have compiled 213 points to their opponents' 57. They have rolled up 32 touchdowns to their opponents' 9 and have racked up 21 points after touchdown to their adversaries' three.

The Bronchos have come by 92 first downs. Their opponents have gathered 48. Seventeen first downs have come through the airways while the remaining 72 were made on the ground.

The Broncs have gained a total of 2581 yards to their opponents' 983. 1979 yards came from ground gains while 599 came through the aerials.

Holzwart Leads Team

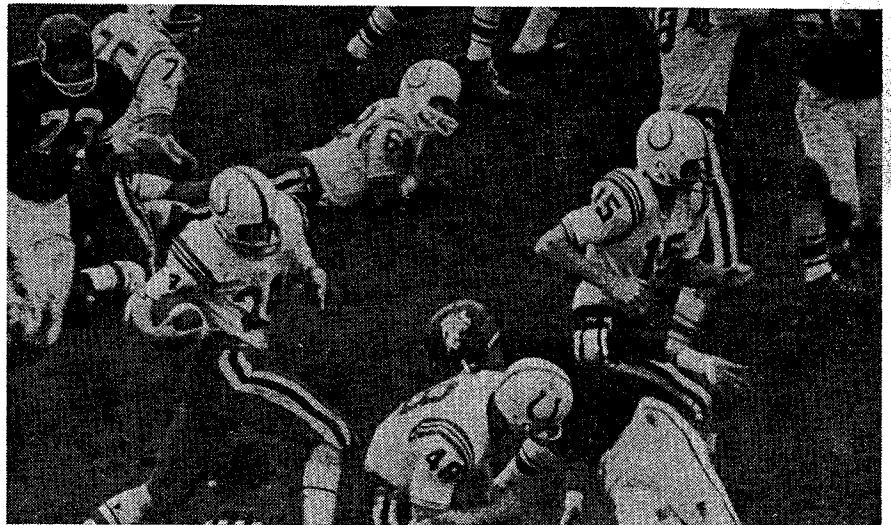
Holzwart has gained an average of 12.2 yards a carry rushing and leads the team with 12 pass completions. He has gained a total of 330 yards. Gary Showers has run with the pigskin 22 times for 159 yards and a 7.2 average. Gary has also attempted 57 passes and completed 29 for 438 yards.

Wood has carried the ball 93 times for 716 yards and a 7.7 yard average. The senior fullback has tallied 11 times and scored 10 P.A.T.'s for 76 points.

Potter has caught six passes for 129 yards and has run with the ball 69 times for 749 yards and an 11 yard a try average. He has a total of 978 yards gained. The senior halfback has also attempted 7 passes and completed 3 for an additional 60. Bill is currently second in the conference scoring with 54 points.

Sophomores Edge Zion - Benton

A wet but happy Homecoming crowd saw the Ponies continue their undefeated string by topping Zion's Zee Bees, 7-0.

The lone TD was scored by Wally Wessel on a one-yard run. Paul Baker ran in the extra point to make it 7-0. Barrington completely muffled Zion's offense. They held their opponents to just 63 yards in net gain, while they themselves gained 190 on offense.

Both teams were hit hard by penalties. Zion was penalized 60 yards, while the Ponies were punished 70 yards.

Paul Baker led the rushing for the Ponies, as he racked up 93 yards in 23 carries. Second was Smith with 32

yards in 10 carries, followed closely by Wessel who gained 19 yards in 5 carries.

Jim Johnson was able to complete two passes out of seven attempts to gain 16 yards. Glen Neal caught one of these for a gain of 14 yards, and Baker caught the other for two yards. Each team had one picked off by the opposition.

The Ponies' next game is at McHenry tomorrow night. They will go after their sixth win in a row. The

Ponies have yet to lose a game, either in conference or regular play.
