As we all know, cold weather comes with the holiday season. I have decided to list a few things every camper needs on a cold campout. Of course, there are many more items that are not listed, so don't limit your duffel to just these! And always remember, cotton is rotten! It soaks up water and sweat, and expedites the lowering of one's body temperature. Here are some things that have helped me keep warm over the years:

- A couple of winter hats that fully cover the ears
- Heavily insulated mittens (gloves will work, too, but not as well)
- Glove liners (just in case the mittens don't cut it)
- Neck Gator
- A couple sets of long underwear
- Warm sweaters (wool or materials of the sort work best) and/or Polar Fleece
- Snow boots
- Winter jacket
- Ski socks (wool socks will keep your feet warm, too, but will not allow moisture to escape as well)
- Snow pants
- Mummy bag or other cold weather sleeping bag
- Sleeping pad
- Hand and feet warmers
- Plastic bags (if your boots ever get wet, you will need these for your feet!)
- Food and lots of water...Food provides your body with the energy to keep you warm, and lots of water keeps you from dehydrating. Drink plenty of water even if you don't think you are thirsty!

It is also necessary that you dress in plenty of layers. As the day passes, you will want to take layers off and, later in the day, want to keep warm with more layers.




Webelos Transition





REMINDER for Scout Advancements:

Attention!! Any Scout who plans to advance to the next rank, please be aware of the following process to do so:

1. Be sure that all the requirements have been completed as indicated by that rank towards the back of the Scout Handbook AND, they have been signed off and dated.
2. Present your Scout Handbook to Mrs. J., Advancement Chairperson to have your entries transferred onto the troop computer using Troop Master. Once those entries have been made, they are now part of the permanent troop record.
3. Mrs. J. the Advancement Chairperson will verify that you have the proper amount of service time for your new rank, participation requirements are met, as well as time in a leadership position where required. If you have any questions on these requirements please see your Patrol Leader, your Senior Patrol Leader, Mrs. J., or Mr. L.
4. Once items 1-3 above are complete, Mrs. Johnson will direct you to see Mr. L. to schedule your Scout Master conference. This is a required step prior to the Board of Review.
