Dear Members and Friends:

It is with both appreciation and anticipation that I send this message to you thanking you for your fine support of the church program throughout the summer months, and reminding you of the beginning of the new church schedule which comes with the arrival of fall. The many participants in the summer church program indicates a deepening awareness on the part of the people of our church that their church is an important part of their lives the year round, and for this Reverend Mettling and I are truly grateful.

Having passed through the summer we now see close upon us the beginning of the full fall schedule which will start September 11th. On that date we will resume the regular schedule of worship and church school at 9:30 and 11 o'clock on Sunday mornings. On that date also we anticipate the return to our pulpit of Mr. Mettling who will be completing his around-the-world trip the preceeding week-end.

With our new building equipped and ready for use, the church school will offer a complete program for all ages at each of the morning hours, except the high school youth who will meet at the 9:30 hour only. S., the Men's Brotherhood, the various committees and commissions are all planning and working toward a year of spiritually enriching activities. Each of us will surely want to take his place in the life and work of our church. Mr. Mettling and I share the hope and prayer that the months ahead will hold many spiritually uplifting moments for our church and for each of you personally. It is our greatest desire that the coming year be a time of spiritual growth, deepening of commitment, and greater understanding of God and his ways.

Dear Friends and Fellow Members of the Church:

I want to use this medium to enter your homes and discuss with you a matter of deep concern to me as pastor of our church.

I have been privileged to be your minister for almost ten years, during which time I have happily and thankfully watched our congregation grow in size, numbers, and influence. But we have paid a price for our growth, the price of knowing one another in an intimate, personal way as members of a Christian fellowship should. The problem is this: How can we maintain the small church atmosphere of friendship and concern in a large church setting of size and numbers.

Surely the answer is not to mechanically stop the growth of the church. To do this is to cease to evangelize, to be true to the gospel of our Lord which is to seek and to save whomsoever we can. It seems to me that the solution lies in another direction, in more adequately organizing ourselves as a congregation, making use of laymen who will commit themselves to be lay ministers of the church in the New Testament tradition.

Briefly, the plan is this. The congregation would be divided into neighborhood groups of approximately ten families each, with a couple commissioned as lay ministers, whose responsibility it would be to know these people, to be aware of their needs, problems, dissatisfactions, sickness, to help them in any way they could, being an intermediary minister between them and the pastor. (Recently I called in one home where sickness had been the constant companion for three months -- and I knew nothing about it!) Also, it would be their responsibility to encourage regular worship at church and participation in all aspects of the church's life and work, as well as to be aware of new people moving into the area.

Inspired by our Lay Leader, Mr. Everett Sproul, the Official Board, at its last meeting, unanimously endorsed such a plan which should be exceedingly fruitful in making our church the fellowship of the concerned which it ought to be; a fellowship where we know each other, bear one another's burdens, act together to witness, to build in our midst that outpost of the kingdom of heaven, the Church of Jesus Christ. Frankly, I know of no other way to meet the challenge of growth in our church, and I feel sure that this effort will meet with your active approval and cooperation.

I am currently endeavoring to prepare sermons pertinent to this subject. They will be presented under the titles: "The Church in Our Town," "Religious Depth: The Lost Dimension," and "Lay Ministers: 1961."





I am most anxious that the words from the pulpit be as helpful as possible to our congregation, and that we avoid the effort to answer questions no one is asking.





A farewell reception for the Rev. and Mrs. Carl G. Mettling and family will be held from 4 to 5:30 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 24, in the Fellowship Room of the Barrington Methodist church.

The official board and the Woman's Society of Christian Service will host the reception. Howard Wagner and Mrs. Fred Welsh, chairman and president of the groups, are in charge of the arrangements. The public is invited.

Rev. Mettling Is Appointed to Wheaton Church

The Rev. Carl G. Mettling will preach his final sermons as pastor of the Barrington Methodist church this Sunday, for on Sunday, Oct. 1, he assumes the pastorate of Gary Memorial Methodist church at Wheaton.

The appointment for the Rev. Mr. Mettling to take over the Wheaton parish was made this past week by Bishop Charles Brashares of the Methodist Rock River conference, Chicago area. The Rev. Mr. Mettling replaces Dr. Allen Billman, who has been appointed district superintendent of the western district. Dr. Billman served the church for nine years. The church has a membership of 2,400.

Successor Not Decided

Until the pastoral committee of the Barrington church and district superintendent, Dr. Amos Thornburg, decide upon a successor for the Rev. Mr. Mettling, the Rev. William Kirk, associate pastor who joined the Barrington parish staff in May, will be in charge.

The Mettling family will be leaving the parsonage at 135 W. Russell st. within the next two weeks to move to Wheaton, where their address will be 216 N. Main st. The four Mettling children, Carla, a senior, John, a sophomore at Barrington High school, and twins, Steve and Stan, 7th graders at Hough Street school, will be transferring to Wheaton schools.

The decision to leave Barrington was a difficult one for the Rev. Mr. Mettling and his wife, Frances, to make. "It has been a lovely decade here," he said. The members of the congregation feel the same way, reports from parishioners indicate.

In his 11th year at the Barrington church, the Rev. Mr. Mettling, 44, came to this parish from Memorial Methodist church at Zion in June, 1951, to succeed Dr. B. G. Swaney. He saw the congregation grow from 840 to the present figure 1,435.

A native of Indiana, he was raised on a farm in Kansas with a family of five brothers. He was graduated from Southwestern college, Winfield, Kans., in 1939, and received his bachelor of divinity degree from Garrett Biblical Institute, Northwestern university, in 1942.

After serving for a year and a half as assistant pastor to Dr. Swaney at DeKalb, the Rev. Mr. Mettling served a student appointment at Bethel Methodist church, Chicago, from March, 1941 to 1943.


From 1943 to 1946 he served as a chaplain in the United States Navy, his principal duty being aboard the aircraft carrier, U.S.S. Kitkum Bay.

He was appointed to the Zion church in 1946 and was there until he assumed the Barrington charge.

The Rev. Mr. Mettling has been active in the Barrington Ministerial Association and has cooperated generously in serving as chaplain for the Barrington Lions club and other civic affairs and rest homes. He is a member of a Lounsbury Masonic lodge.

In 1958 the pastor was a member of a Christian World Seminar Tour, and in the summer of 1960 he was director of a similar tour around the world. The tours included receptions, meetings and interviews arranged with interdenominational groups of Christian and other religious leaders and embassy officials in each country. Prime Minister Nehru of India was among the dignitaries who received the group.

ON LEAVING BARRINGTON METHODIST CHURCH

September 24, 1961

Now may I conclude with some personal reminiscence.

It seems only yesterday that the moving van was unloading us at our new resident in Barrington in the parsonage by the lovely colonial church, though it was more than ten years ago. That means that Carla was 7 years old, John 5, and Steve and Stan still in diapers.

A reception was soon held and a lovely floor lamp given the parsonage family, with some appropriate, though snide, remarks made about hoping that the new minister would be a shining light!

The first sermon, I well remember, was on the theme "Interdependence" using Paul's statement, "I planted, Appolos watered, but God giveth the increase."

Because of the successful work of my predecessor, Dr. Swaney, the Church when I came was bursting at the seams, especially with Sunday School children. So our effort that first year went towards planning for our first educational unit to the north. I well remember the number of meetings, the midnight oil, the cups of coffee consumed as we labored together in a common cause. The congregation gave a unanimous vote of approval to our plans which were carried out amidst general rejoicing. About fifteen months later, in the fall of 1953, our new building and balcony was consecrated on a Sunday, November 8th, by Bishop Brashares.

With our building completed, which we thought would last a life-time, we turned our thoughts to other emphases. We began to think in terms of our larger ministry to others. With this thought in mind, we received our second new American family, the Fabrycys, having received our first a little earlier, the Novoselskis. This was followed later with our third family, the Harry Blumes.

About this time our concern for others led us to make a study of our benevolence program. As a result we searched for and found the mission field in Nepal. A real

highlight of my ministry here was the Sunday morning the Flemings talked in our Church for the first time. The winsome personalities won our hearts to them and to their work. This has been a great blessing to them and to our Church.

The years 1956-57 saw our Church growing to the extent that a youth minister was added to the staff of one minister and one secretary. Dick Quinlan served our Church well, ably followed by Harly Hagmann , and now Bill Kirk.

The year 1957 witnessed the moving of the parsonage from just south of the Church to its present location at 135 West Russell. The moving was uneventful except that it took the preacher a long time to get his bearing in the new location as the house was turned 180 degrees, so that what was south on the inside was north on the outside!

Moving the parsonage amidst many grunts and groans of neighbors was a prelude to our second building venture which resulted in our lovely new building to the south, consecrated a year ago next November.

This was truly a wonderfully uplifting experience of organization, team work, cooperation. We were all caught up in a great spiritual enterprise, successful beyond our fondest dreams. I shall never forget our victory dinner the last night of the campaign as this group of a hundred or more men sat in the basement watching the final returns come in. Our goal was \$240,000. Would we make it? It was questionable. But as the last report came in we were over by \$275.00. We stood and cheered and sang the Doxology. It was wonderful!

And then I shall never forget the opportunity I had to travel, tendered me by members of this Church in the summer of 1958, and the privilege of going again in 1960. These have been wonderfully broadening experiences for me, making possible one of the most important days of my life when in India we met and talked with Prime Minister Nehru.

Yes, it has been a wonderful 10 years, years when we have together tasted difficulty, opportunity, progress, and life's joys and sorrows.

Since being here, it has been my privilege to unite 115 couples in holy matrimony, making possible part of the current population explosion.

It has been my responsibility to lay to rest the mortal remains of 98 of your loved ones and friends; baptize 405 children and adults.

Also, during this time our membership has grown from approximately 600 to 1450. And likewise our budget from \$18,000 to about \$90,000 in addition to our building programs.

I have purposely not mentioned any particular organization or names of individuals, lest I overlook one of the many that should receive this recognition.

But of special joy to me, and to Fran has been the establishment of the small Yokefellow group in the church, and the Prayer Circle. We fondly hope and pray that these will grow and multiply to the spiritual enrichment of the church and its members.

Now in conclusion let me say that it has been a real pleasure and joy to be your minister. You have been so good to us that it has always been difficult to talk about your sins! Perhaps the one word that best sums up my feelings on this occasion is the word gratitude. I am grateful to you for the privilege of being your minister. I came to you with considerable corn sticking out my ears -- still do, I guess, but it's ripening. You have helped me to grow in the ministry. You have forced me to think, to dig deeper, to enlarge my heart and my understanding.

Many of you have kindly expressed gratitude to me for my work with you. I assure you that I am even more grateful to you.

Finally, I am grateful to God for calling me, a boy off the farm in Kansas, into the most glorious work in the world, a minister of Christ. What joy, what drama, what satisfaction there is in this work! If I could just convey this to young men and women, the ministry would not lack for candidates. I definitely have never made a sacrifice in the ministry.

It is the joy of breaking the bread of life to the spiritually hungry, of helping another find God in his life. It is like the story carried by the press a few years ago of the ship that was wrecked off the shore of Beirut, Lebanon. Young Tom Ball an American passenger swam out and saved three lives. Afterwards he made a statement

which the Christian Century picked up as the statement of the year. Said he, "It is a wonderful thing to reach down and feel another hand clasp yours and know that you have saved a human life."

That's what it's like to be a minister of Jesus Christ, for which I shall always be eternally grateful.

It is a real wrench to leave; it is always difficult to leave loved ones and friends. But we feel "inside" that this is the time to go. May I ask that you do not invite me back for pastoral functions, that is the work of your new minister who will need your help, your love and loyalty. However, this does not mean that we give you up as friends. You are forever enshrined in our hearts.
