Services and Classes

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Lent

Is a period of introspection. It is also a time to reflect on the life of Christ, the sacrifice he made for us and his victory over sin and death. To this end, you are invited to participate in Taizé style worship services and classes during the month of March.

The Taizé worship service takes the form of meditative common prayer. Gathered in the presence of Christ, led by our Director of Music and Organist, Ms. Joy Hague, we sing uncomplicated repetitive songs. These songs, uncluttered by too many words, allow the mystery of God to become tangible through the beauty of simplicity. Between the times of singing, there are reflections of the evening's readings and times for personal reflection.

The services will be held on March 3, March 10, March 17 and March 31 starting at 7:00 p.m.

Classes will be held on March 3, March 10, March 17 and March 31 from 7:45 p.m. until 9:00 p.m.

Dr. Baxter's class, "Discovering the Gospel of Thomas", will focus on one of the Gnostic gospels which did not make it into the Bible. Class will be held in the Parlor.



In the Youth Lounge, Rev. Spike and Ms. Armstrong-Hansche will present "The Gospel According to the Simpsons", which will investigate religious themes in the popular animated TV series.

On March 24 at 7:00 p.m., in Fellowship Hall, Rev. Marthame and Ms. Elizabeth Sanders, Presbyterian missionaries returning from three and a half years in Zababdeh, the only Christian town in the Northern West Bank, will share their experiences and show their film, "Salt of the Earth: Christians in the Northern West Bank".

Dear Friends in Christ,

By the time you receive this Carillon, the Church will be squarely in the season of Lent during which we prepare for Easter. What is the concern of Easter? Easter is never about *just the facts*. Faith and fact, while not mutually exclusive, should never be confused with each other. Easter is a difficult time for believers to be clear in their thinking because the facts are so elusive. The women and the disciples testified about an empty tomb. Some other disciples told about how they saw and touched Jesus' body. They reported that Jesus consumed food, and yet he was able to move through locked doors. How are we to understand those accounts of a resurrection body in relation to what we understand our own bodies to be like?

What are the facts? **Fact:** the disciples were transformed by their encounters with the risen Christ after he was dead and placed in a tomb, which was now empty. **Fact:** only believers saw the risen Christ. **Fact:** for better or worse the world was forever changed by Christ's resurrection.

What does our faith proclaim? Answering this question is the task of every believer. Easter people proclaim that death does not have the final word, ever. Easter people proclaim that our God is a God who raises the dead. Easter people proclaim freedom to act with integrity and to stand for justice, no matter what the temporal consequences may be. Easter people proclaim Jesus as the Christ, risen from the dead!

Easter people need to wrestle with the facts and with the faith that we proclaim. We will not discover all the answers during this Lenten season. But, in our search, Easter people continue the dialogue with one another so that our experiences of the risen Christ may impact our everyday faith.

Church Administration

San Marcos Update A Report From Chip Kyle

San Marcos Urban Youth Outreach has been a mission outreach of the Presbytery of Chicago and a particular passion of this church over the last twenty years. During this time, the program has taken several forms and has received volunteer support and funding from a number of congregations besides Barrington. Over these years, the program has faced many challenges. This past year has seen more than its share of challenges for the program and for the young men and women who participate in and benefit from it. The program has always been financially challenged – only running a surplus once in the last decade, with deficits ranging from minor overruns to major shortfalls. The Presbytery has stood behind the program financially, making up any shortfall, and charging the accumulated deficit against the assets of the program (primarily the buildings on W. Augusta). At the beginning of this past year, many issues came together simultaneously: the Executive Director was placed on administrative leave; the Program Director, though inexperienced, was asked to assume some of the responsibilities of the Exec. Dir. as well as continue his regular duties; the lack of a female staff member was critically identified; and the multi-year accumulated deficit began to reach the value of the buildings.

To address these issues, the Presbytery called an Administrative Commission in June, 2003 to examine the program. The Commission was charged to conduct a comprehensive review and evaluation of the history, governance, facilities, program, funding, and staffing of the San Marcos ministry; and to propose recommendations for the future of the ministry. The Commission presented its report at the December, 2003 Presbytery Assembly meeting. The report contained the following principal recommendations:

(1) Sell the facility (sanctuary and manse) and use the first \$200,000 of the proceeds to partially offset the accumulated debt and use the remaining proceeds to fund Hispanic / Latino youth programs / services.

(2) Dissolve the current board of directors and form a new, interim board with representation from at least three different churches and with at least two representatives from the Hispanic community.

(3) The Interim Board will design and seek a location for a neighborhood-based program for Hispanic/Latino youth, and shall secure covenant partners in order to request Presbytery funding.

(4) That current staff (Omar and Sofia) shall be retained under Presbytery supervision. Current staff and any temporary staff hired by the Interim Board shall be eligible to apply for a position with the redesigned program.

(5) The new program design shall make provision for the continuation of the scholarships for the 12 current San Marcos participants at St. Gregory's.

(6) The new program(s), partnership, and funding shall be in place by October 31, 2004.

(7) If a new program design and funding commitment are not in place by October 31, 2004, the Presbyterian Church of Barrington shall assume full responsibility for the current scholarship students, and the other elements of the current program shall cease.

(8) Assuming new program(s), partnerships and funding are in place, a new permanent board of directors will replace the Interim Board by December 31, 2004.

At its February meeting, members of the Interim Board were nominated and approved by the Presbytery Assembly. The following congregations are represented on the board: Vida Nueva, Chicago Fourth, Wilmette, and Barrington. We request your prayers for all members of the board, asking that God's guidance, wisdom, and compassion direct their efforts as the "new" San Marcos is established.

Session

Special Stewardship Campaign Update

You did it, with God's help! As of February 1st, 94 Families added to their pledge, gave one-time gifts, or pledged for the first time, with gifts ranging from \$50 to \$3,000.

Coupled with savings in office administration and extra gifts at the end of 2003, your broad outpouring of faith and commitment will allow our church to come close to meeting our 2004 Pledge Campaign goals. With a budget that will be in excess of \$705,000, the Session will be able to provide most of the funding for the goals outlined in the 2004 Campaign. As commitments continue to come in, we hope that we will be able to report to you in a future Carillon article that we have achieved our entire goal.


Trustees

Notes from the February 9, 2004 meeting.

Financial: Sandy Schild had handed over her responsibilities. Patty Griffin has started work as the staff accountant.

Trustees are talking to Harris Bank about streamlining the Church's Business Processes with them. Some suggestions: 1) Direct withdrawal for monthly bills, 2) Limit check runs to twice a month, 3) change to Harris Bank Credit Cards, the Bank will guarantee them on our account. Cards would be issued to Curt, Dan and Melissa.

Building: Rick Rogers discussed concern that the new downspouts on the Northwest corners, that were just replaced, are frozen. A plan should be developed for next year to heat them.



There is a leak in the flat roof in the Hallway going in to the offices. The hole has been patched. The garage damage was inspected. Kirchner came in as the low bidder for its repair. The benches and 3 stools from the ladies lounge were picked up for repair. The carpeting for the Christian Education floor is extremely worn. It was agreed that this should be a priority for this year in terms of repairing and replacing it.

Grounds: We will go out for bid on our landscaping services. This should be done every 3-5 years. Kris Jensen is developing a Request For Proposal to be sent to several companies who are interested in submitting bids. We would like to discuss rates and different ideas for the grounds maintenance. There will be a "pre-proposal" meeting to tour grounds.

Next meeting of the Board of Trustees will be on March 15 instead of March 8.

...after the phone call you'd always hoped you'd never get.

...after you realize the hands on the gold watch you received at your retirement party move more slowly than you ever imagined.

...after the nursing home director shakes your hand and says, "Welcome to your new home."

...after the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away.

...after the baby has arrived, putting more demands on you than you ever dreamed possible.

...after you find the pink slip inserted with what is now your final paycheck.

...after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

Parish Life

The Memorial Garden

The Trustees have developed a brochure and an Interment Agreement for the Memorial Garden. Below are some of the details from the agreement. If you wish further information and /or a copy of the brochure and agreement, please contact the church office.

Purpose

The Memorial Garden is dedicated to and reserved for use as a lasting memorial providing for the interment or scattering of cremated human remains of members of the Presbyterian Church of Barrington and designated members of their families.

Governing Body

A Trustee will chair the committee to consist of no less than one Trustee and three members at large. The committee shall supervise the operation of the garden and its records, maintenance and fee structures.

Interment Agreement and Fees

This Interment Agreement, issued by the Church, shall be required for use of the Garden. The fee of \$600.00 must be paid prior to use of the garden.

The fee will guarantee interment in the garden, designation on the Memorial Plaque and recording of the name and appropriate data in a remembrance book. The fee may be prepaid at any time in the amount in effect at the time of payment.

Eligible for interment are immediate family members of the applicant, to wit: self, spouse, antecedents, decedents and siblings, or others granted by written permission, without regard to church affiliation.

Terms and Conditions

Services are the responsibility of the ministerial staff of The Presbyterian Church of Barrington and all appropriate fees shall apply. Clergy of other churches may officiate or assist with Session approval.

Memorial wreaths, floral displays, flags or other ornamentation may be placed in the garden, but will be removed after one week or becoming unsightly. There will be no monuments or headstones within the garden confines. There will be an outdoor fixed monument, acknowledging those who have been interred in the garden.

The maintenance reserve of the garden shall bear the responsibility for the perpetual maintenance of the garden. Named memorials and donations may be made to this fund. A plaque in the church acknowledges those who have contributed to the garden fund.
