"UNCLE JOE" ON THE PENDING CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.
Speaker Cannon is among those who are telling the voters throughout the state to vote for the pending constitutional amendment. He has "been in Chicago and knows what a vast development for improvement there is in that city. He says that if the amendment can do anything to improve conditions there (and he thinks it can) the voters of the state would simply be securing the wrath of God to cast their ballots against the measure. A great many of "Uncle Joe's" hearers are likely to take his word for it and vote for any further instruction or information.

CANDIDATE SHERMAN FAVORS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.
Judge Lawrence V. Sherman, Republican candidate for lieutenant governor is said to understand municipal conditions in Chicago remarkably well for a man living in the central part of the state. In the legislature Judge Sherman has usually favored legislation, asked by Chicago, which he regarded as reasonable. In some instances, however, he has scored that city in severe terms. He advocates the adoption of the pending constitutional amendment, designed to give Chicago the right to elect its mayor, and he will relieve the legislature in the future of a great deal of trouble, which if the amendment is defeated, Chicago will have to bear. The vote on them is not exact to say, but he is not a doubt Judge Sherman's position is logical. He knows also that Chicago needs a broader charter, and that it is his duty to the state to assist her in getting it.

CONCERNING THE SPECIAL BALLOT.
There will be three propositions on the special ballot at the November election for the voters to consider. In all probability the first will be the constitutional amendment to enable the legislature to grant Chicago a new charter. The other two will be the questions of direct primaries and home rule in taxation. The vote on them will be taken on the 11th. The purpose of ascertaining the sentiment of the people in respect to those questions. The constitutional amendment is considered of vital importance to Chicago. Efforts were made for several years before the legislature was induced to submit such an amendment to the voters. Don't forget that through the indifference or negligence of the voters, the work will all have to be done over again. Judges of the special ballot, and this is considered a great aid in inducing the voters to mark it properly and hand it in to the election officials. The amendment must have a majority of all the votes cast in the state in order to be adopted. No majority of special numbers will be counted on the other questions, but it is always well for the voter to mark his ballot for such questions one way or the other. It is to be noted that the whole state will be cast in the state at the coming election, and if so this will be about 80,000 increase over the last presidential election.
