Annual Town Meetings.

At the annual township meetings held in Barrington and Cuba Tuesday the following resolution was adopted: "Resolved, that it is the sense of this meeting that the assessor of the township be requested to omit from the schedules of personal property within the village of Barrington, all dogs, such dogs having already been taxed by the village of Barrington."

The village of Barrington has an ordinance which requires that a license fee of \$1 being paid for every dog within the village. The assessors heretofore have also included the dogs on their schedules with the result that a great deal of dissatisfaction has existed on account of double taxation.

Barrington township appropriated \$30 and Cuba township \$25 for Memorial day observance.

Reports of township officers were read and approved and levy for town purposes made.

Eligible Ordinance Passed Relative to Better Sidewalks

The village board held an adjourned meeting at the village hall last evening. The sidewalk ordinance which has been under consideration some time past came up and was adopted by a unanimous vote.

The ordinance provides that hereafter all walks shall be constructed of cement, tar composition, stone or paving brick. The board walk is condemned forever. Walks in the residence district are to be of a uniform width of five feet. A ten foot walk is provided for the business district.

As an encouragement to our citizens to build substantial walks the ordinance provides that if the owner constructs the walk he or she will be entitled to 12 cents for each running foot, to be paid out of the village treasury. If the walk has to be built by special assessment, the property owner will receive no assistance from the village but will have to pay the cost.

Tides on the Great Lakes.

Disturbance of the water level on the great lakes from causes other than the moon's influence is considered in Engineering News by Clyde Potts, who says:

There is undoubtedly a tide on Lake Michigan and on all the great lakes, for, as some old hydrographers has said, there is a tide in a leucop. The tides on the great lakes due to the moon may or may not be apparent, but they are not slight in the other disturbances of the water level. The water in the lake acts as an evenly balanced piston and weighs the atmosphere in pressure at each end (for side). Frequently preceding a heavy storm the self-registering water gauge recorded fluctuations of two feet or more coming in and going out as large tidal waves with a period between high and high, varying from twenty minutes to more than an hour. It was apparent that the elapsed time between high and high depended on what point on the coast the barometric pressures created the waves. If the wave was created by a difference of pressure at points on the east and west sides of the lake (approximately ninety miles), then the time between high and high would be in motion by a difference of pressure at north and south ends. The average duration of twenty minutes waves traveling across the lake.

It is really the same thing on a large scale as what would happen if we were to take an oblong basin of water and set a wave traveling lengthwise or crosswise by tilting motion. The geographical situation of Milwaukee is such that waves from north and south ends would show on the record long north and again in the same time in a few minutes on the next trip south.

On Lake Erie, which lies in the direction of the prevailing winds, the effect of the wind is added to barometric pressure and violent fluctuations. A sudden rise and sudden fall of water will be shown in the government gauges at the east and west ends at almost the same instant.

Making and Keeping Friends.

The gift of keeping friends is more rare than the knack of making friends. Napoleon did not naturally have deeper regard for those upon whom they bestow favors than for those from whom they receive favors. This may be straining the point for emphasis, yet there is something in it.

Friendship cannot be safely lent, but it may be freely given. In the long run these friendships are the happiest when the friendship is given solely for moral worth and not for usefulness.
