AN ORDINANCE Providing for the construction of sidewalks along various streets in the Village of Barrington, Counties of Cook and Lake and State of Illinois.

Section 1. That all sidewalks which shall be ordered by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington shall be constructed under the superintendence and to the satisfaction of the Committee on Sidewalks, and subject to their approval, and shall be built by the contractor provided, of the width hereinafter specified and shall be constructed as follows:

The inside surface line of every sidewalk shall be twelve inches from and parallel with the line of the lot along and in front of which the said sidewalk is to be constructed. That portion of the sidewalk to be laid shall be brought to a grade fifteen (15) inches below the established grade of such sidewalk and such space so excavated or filled, with such concrete of the width of four inches more than the cement portion of such walk and shall incline upwards and evenly on both sides to the cement outer edges of such sidewalk, to be approved by the said Committee on Sidewalks.

Section 5. The grade for sidewalks shall be established by the President and Board of Trustees as soon as possible, where such has not already been done, but in all cases where no established grade for new sidewalks shall be that fixed by the President and Board of Trustees from time to time. It shall be the duty of any person laying or constructing a sidewalk in the said village to apply for and ascertain such grade. If no grade shall be fixed, the contractor shall apply to the President and Board of Trustees for a portion thereof and, in case of failure, neglect or refusal of the person so directed to immediately apply to the President and Board of Trustees, which they may proceed as if no sidewalk or portion thereof had been laid.

Section 6. Whenever any sidewalk or portion thereof is directed to be laid, the President and Board of Trustees shall cause notice thereof to be given to the owners of the property concerned.

Section 7. Whenever the owner or occupant of any lot, piece or parcel of land in said Village shall be notified by the President and Board of Trustees to raise, lower, repair or build any sidewalk in front of, adjacent to or upon any premises owned or occupied by him, it shall be the duty of such owner or occupant to cause the said improvement to be made in the manner and within the time prescribed, if any owner or occupant shall neglect or refuse to comply with such requirement, then in that case the said improvement shall be made by the said Village in accordance with the specifications herein and the cost for the same shall be charged against such lot, piece or parcel of land as hereinafter provided.

Section 8. A bill of the cost of any sidewalk constructed by the owner of the lot, piece or parcel of the land fronting

Section 9. In case of failure to collect the said special tax in the manner aforesaid, the Village Clerk shall, within one year thereafter, make a report of all such special taxes in writing to the County Collector of the said Cook or Lake County, as the case may be, of all the lots and parcels of land upon which such special tax shall be so unpaid, with the names of the respective owners thereof, so far as the same are known to him, and the amount due and unpaid upon such tax, together with a copy of the ordinance providing for such sidewalks in the manner prescribed by Section 4 of the Act of General Assembly of the State of Illinois entitled "An Act to provide additional means for the construction of sidewalks in cities, towns and villages, in force July 1st, 1875."

Section 10. Whenever in the opinion of the Committee on Sidewalks, any board sidewalk shall be deemed in a condition too poor to repair, then the Committee on Sidewalks shall recommend to the President and Board of Trustees that a new sidewalk be ordered. The property owner of the lot shall then be notified and shall be given at least thirty days within which to make the improvement as herein by this ordinance provided.

Section 11. Whenever any sidewalk is constructed under the terms of this ordinance by the owner of the adjoining lot, then the said Village of Barrington shall pay to such owner twelve cents per front foot as its proportion of the cost of the construction of said sidewalk along the lot, piece or parcel of land in front of which the said sidewalk is constructed, and payment shall be made upon the order of the President and Board of Trustees out of the funds of the said Village appropriated for this purpose. The remainder of the cost shall be borne by the owners of the lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to their frontage on said sidewalk.

(10), the South side of said Station Street adjoining lots 816 (6), Seven (7) and Eight (8) in Block Nine (9); the East side of Cook Street adjoining lot Eight (8) in Block Nine (9) and lot One (1) in Block Ten (10); the West side of Cook Street adjoining lots Four (4) and Five (5) in Block One (1); the South side of South Railroad Street adjoining lots Five (5) and Six (6) in Block One (1) and Lots One (1) and Two (2) in Block Ten (10); the South side of Main Street adjoining lots Seven (7) and Eight (8) in Block One (1); the North side of Main Street adjoining lots One (1), Two (2), Three (3), and Four (4) in Owner's Subdivision and Lots One (1), Two (2), Three (3) and Four (4) in Block B; the East side of South Street adjoining lot Eight (8) in Block One (1); the East side of Walnut Street adjoining lot One (1) in Owner's Subdivision.

Section 4. All sidewalks to be notified by the President and Board of Trustees shall be constructed under the provisions of this ordinance shall be allowed three days after such ordinance thereof provided, in which the contractor to construct the said sidewalk along a portion of such lot, piece or parcel of land shall thereupon believe the same to be special tax provided for the construction of said sidewalk. Whenever any such sidewalk shall be constructed by the owner of the lot, piece or parcel of land fronting said sidewalk, such contractor shall be under the superintendence and to the satisfaction of the Committee on Sidewalks and must conform with the specifications herein provided, which shall be approved by the said Committee on Sidewalks.

Section 5. The grade for sidewalks shall be established by the President and Board of Trustees as soon as possible, where such has not already been done, but in all cases where no established grade for new sidewalks shall be that fixed by the President and Board of Trustees from time to time. It shall be the duty of any person laying or constructing a sidewalk in the said village to apply for and ascertain such grade. 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Section 11. The remainder of the cost shall be borne by the owners of the lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to their frontage on said sidewalk.

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upon the said sidewalk shading in separate lots, the cost of grading materials, laying down and superintending, shall be laid in the office of the Clerk of the Village of Barrington, according to the order of the Committee on Sidewalks; also a list of the lots or parcels of land touching upon the lines of said sidewalks, the names of the owners thereof and the frontage. Whereupon the said Village Clerk shall prepare a special tax list against such lots or parcels of land and the owners thereof, according to the provisions of the ordinance of the said Village, and a copy of said list or parcels shall be filed in the office of the Clerk of the Village of Barrington, and the same shall be subject to the collection of the amount of special tax as aforesaid and appearing upon said special tax list to be levied upon the lots or parcels of land upon which such sidewalk, and the said Village Collector shall proceed to collect the said taxes in the manner provided for in Section 9 of the ordinance of the said Village, entitled "An Act to provide additional means for the construction of sidewalks in cities, towns and villages, in force July 1st, 1875."

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Section 12. Any ordinance heretofore passed by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington, in conflict herewith or inconsistent with any

of the provisions herein, are hereby repealed. Section 12. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately on and after the passage and publication as provided by law. 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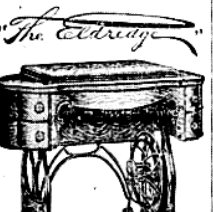
