SPECIAL MEETING

Supervisor Miller of Libertyville
Elected Chairman of the Lake
County Board.

A special meeting of the Lake coun-
ty board of supervisors was held at
Waukegan Wednesday for the purpose
of organizing. Miles T. Lamey of Bar-
rington was chosen temporary chair-
man.

The question of the right of the
board to seat J. G. Boess of Shields
township as assistant supervisor, was
referred to Sir and A. Coffey Hanna,
and a recess of 15 minutes taken.

On the reconvening of the board
Mr. Hanna made a report to the effect
that under the law Shields was not
entitled to an additional supervisor,
the law requiring that the township
shall have a population of at least
4,000 as shown at the last federal or
state census. The township did not
have within a few hundred of the
required number at the date of the last
census.

W. H. Anderson of North Chicago
was granted permission to address the
board and argued that while the law-
lessness may not have had the re-
quisite population at the last census
that they now had more than the
number required.

The board, however, was of the
opinion that Mr. Boess was not en-
titled to a seat and refused to seat
him.

W. E. Miller of Libertyville and
Denison Huntington of Elk were nomi-
nated for chairman and an informal
ballot taken with the following re-
sult:
Miller 12; Huntington 5; Wooley 1.
On motion of Supervisor Wooley Mr.
Miller was chosen by a unanimous
vote.
