**AN ORDINANCE**

Amending Ordinance No. 7, New Series of the Village of Barrington, providing for the construction of sidewalks along the various streets in the Village of Barrington, County of Cook and Lake and State of Illinois.  
Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington:

**Section 1.**

That Section 1 of said Ordinance No. 7, new series, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

**Section 2.**

That all sidewalks which shall be ordered by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington shall be constructed under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the Committee on Sidewalks, and subject to their approval, and shall be built, except as hereinafter

provided, of the width hereinafter specified and shall be constructed as follows:

The inside surface line of every sidewalk shall be not more than twelve inches from and parallel with the line of the lot, along and in front of which the said sidewalk is to be constructed. That portion of the street upon which the said sidewalk is to be laid shall be brought to a grade twelve (12) inches below the established grade of such sidewalk and such space so excavated or filled shall be at its base of the width of four inches more than the cement portion of such walk and shall incline upwards and evenly on both sides to the cement outer edges of such sidewalk. The lower eight inches of such space shall be filled with a layer of cinders or coarse clean gravel, thoroughly rammed and compacted, the top of said layer of cinders to be four inches below the grade for said walk when completed. Upon said gravel or cinders shall be laid a layer of at least three inches of standard Portland cement concrete, which shall consist of one part cement, two parts of coarse sharp sand and three parts of broken limestone or five parts of clean coarse gravel, of the size to pass through a ring of one-inch diameter, the cement and sand to be thoroughly mixed dry, and the five parts of broken limestone or five parts of clean coarse gravel to be thoroughly mixed dry, and the whole shall be evenly spread over the surface so as to insure a smooth, even and level surface.  
The sidewalk shall be so constructed that when completed the top surface shall conform to the permanent grade, if such has been established, and if not so established, then on to the grade which the said President and Board of Trustees shall establish before said sidewalk is constructed. The said cement portion of said sidewalk shall be of a uniform width of five feet, except as is otherwise provided, and shall incline upwards slightly from the outer edge of the walk toward the line of the adjoining lots, at the rate of one inch to five feet throughout, and all street corners and sidewalks shall turn at seven feet beyond the lot line. Along the sides of the sidewalk shall be placed strips of sand at least six inches wide.

**Section 3.**

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately on and after its publication and passage as provided by law.  
Adopted by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington this 27th day of April, A. D. 1905.
