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EXPRESS AGENTS BLOCK PEACE

Refuse to Make Any Move Looking Toward Settlement of Strike.

EMPLOYERS ARE FORCING ISSUE

Lumber Industries Are Being Tied Up by Demands That Men Deliver Goods to Strike-Bound Houses or Quit.

Chicago, May 24.—Efforts to bring about peace in the teamsters' strike failed today, and continuing last night. The day had offered bright prospects centering on a conference at midnight, but after that conference was ended all present hopes of a settlement were abandoned by both parties to the struggle.

The meeting upon which high hopes had been placed was held in the office of Attorney Levy Mayer. It was attended by the general manager, agents and James H. Barry, business agent of the express drivers.

The express companies promptly and emphatically refused Mr. Barry's demand for the reinstatement of all of the striking express drivers except those guilty of violence—the only offer, he said, that his union exposed him to make.

When the business agent asked the representatives of the companies whether they would agree to an interchange of men—take former employees of the American Express company in the employ of the United States Express company, and so on down the line—he was told that the employers would not guarantee any such proposition—that all applications would have to be considered on their merits.

Strike Zone Widening.

The failure of the express companies and the union to agree on terms of settlement came after a day that saw a material widening of the strike zone. Nearly 500 teamsters, employed by the twenty six different lumber firms, struck when ordered to deliver strike-affected houses.

From 150 to 200 lumber teamsters probably will join the strike, it being the intention of members of the Lumbermen's association to force the issue. Officers of the Association of Manufacturers of Building Material, employing 700 teamsters, and the millmen, manufacturers of sashes, doors and blinds, with 125 drivers, announced after meetings in the Hector building, that they would deliver wherever they had orders, including to strike-bound houses.

In spite of the spread of the strike there was no perceptible increase of violence. Instead of the 175 importations were received from Missouri—mostly farm boys. Three hundred are expected today.

Long Dunned Out, Says Mayer.

Mayor Danne in an interview said: "It looks as if it would be a long drawn out strike. Both sides seem to forget that 2,600,000 people are suffering on account of their failure to come to terms."

The police department will be able to fill all requisitions. An informed, and unless the strike spreads more rapidly than we expect, it will not be necessary to call for the militia. As to what will be needed later, no one can tell. We must have to keep in close touch with the situation.

"Peace, life, and property will be preserved, and if the militia is required it will be called out promptly. I already have had several talks with Gov. Deneen on that subject."

Sheriff Barrett's statement was to the same effect.

Looks Stormy to Levy Mayer.

As reported by the general manager on behalf of the employers, Levy Mayer said that the strike situation presented nothing to his mind but a renewal of hostilities.

"So far as I know," said he, "there will be no more peace conferences. The employers have ended everything they can to bring an end to the struggle, and if there is peace it must be an honorable peace."

Mr. Mayer expressed some question as to whether the police could furnish guards enough for the wagons of the lumbermen, saying that he understood they had resulted in the capture of the mail for the accommodation of the party during their stay here. Macheon was allowed to visit his family.

VETERANS MEET AT ROCKFORD

Report of Adjutant General Shows a Loss of 2,320 Members.

Rockford, Ill., May 24.—Four thousand veterans, members of the ladies of the G. A. R., W. R. C., Sons of Veterans, and the auxiliary orders are in the city to attend the annual encampment of the Illinois Grand Army of the Republic. The delegates were welcomed by Mayor Charles E. Jackson on the part of Rockford and Congressmen Charles E. Taylor and James H. McPherson for the northern part of the state. Responses were made by the heads of the various departments adjacent to the G. A. R. Department Commander Woods speaking for the G. A. R. itself. Among the speakers were Robert Mann Woods, department commander; T. G. Lawler of Rockford and J. H. Stribb and James O'Donnell of Chicago.

A reception and ball was given by Illinois division, Sons of Veterans.

The report of the adjutant general of the G. A. R. will be made by Charles Partridge and will show a membership of 19,554. A loss for the year of 2,320 members.

METCALF TO QUIT THE CABINET

Tires of Official Life and Years for Business Career on Coast.

Washington dispatch: Victor Howard Metcalf, secretary of the department of commerce and labor, has fired of his official position and is planning to retire so as to engage in business in California. He has not determined just when he will give up his portfolio. He has not found life as the head of an executive department as congenial as he expected.

There is neither glory nor money in being the head of a department that deals with such prosy subjects as commerce and labor. When Mr. Metcalf left congress to take the vacancy created by the death of Secretary H. Cortelyou he determined that he would not return to congress, hence his going from the cabinet will be followed by his entry into active business life.

BISHOP SPALDING IS STILL ILL

Returns to Peoria, but is Placed in Poor, Ill. Dispatch.

Bishop John I. Spalding returned Thursday from St. Francis, where he has been for the past month for his health, following a heart attack. While slightly improved, the bishop's condition is not satisfactory, and he was taken to St. Francis hospital, where he will continue treatment. He is still in bed, and his condition is not very hopeful. He has no use whatever of his left arm, which he carries in a sling. William Doyle, a physical culture teacher returned from the city, and will remain with him. He has been working with the physicians, and to him more than to the doctors Bishop Spalding attributes his improvement.

MACHEN IS GRANTED LIBERTIES

Convicted Postal Employe Is Housed in Washington Hotel.

Washington, D. C., special: August W. Machen, former general superintendent of the free delivery service of the postoffice department, who was brought here from the Mountsides prison, Md., to trial as one of the defendants in the Crawford-Machen-Lorenz case, has been taken to a local hotel. Deputy Warden Boyd and Haddock of the West Virginia penitentiary, who came to the city with Machen, are at the same hotel. Warden Harris, it is said, refused to be made responsible for Machen, although he expected to do so.
