VICINITY NEWS
Clipped from Exchanges and Told by Correspondents.

Editor Fowler of the Waukegan Sun and Editor Just of the Libertyville Independent are telling what they know about each other through the columns of their publications.

Mrs. Jennie Riddle, of Elgin, has commenced suit against the village of Genoa for the sum of \$5,000 in personal damages, alleged to have been caused falling from a defective sidewalk into the excavation made for a new building. Village officials have endeavored to settle the suit without avail.

If the plans of County Superintendent of Cook county, N. Gaugan of Lake county carry, there will be held either at Libertyville or Grayslake, beginning about July 16, a county normal. This is without doubt welcome news to those teachers who find it impossible to pursue a course of work away from home.

Elgin is growing. Figures compiled by enumerators working on the new directory soon to be issued, show that the watch city has recovered from its lethargy of the past half decade and today is a growing, thriving, progressive place where nearly 2,000 people have settled within the past twelve months. The canvass shows a population of 26,816.

The official announcement of a four-day meeting next month on the new mile track at Libertyville, assures the northern Illinois lovers of light harness racing some high-class sport. The dates selected are July 4, 5, 6 and 7, with three races each day, the purse being \$500 for each class. This meeting will bring out a big string of fast horses and result in good racing. The Libertyville track is said to be like a billiard table this spring.

The members of St. Mary's parish, Woodstock, have concluded to erect a new parochial residence for their new priest, Rev. M. S. Gilmartin. A number of the men of the congregation met immediately after the mass last Sunday morning and agreed among themselves to erect a new parochial residence. One that will be in keeping with the affluence and wealth of the Catholics of this community. Inside of ten minutes over \$1,200 were subscribed. Never, perhaps, in the history of St. Mary's church was there seen a more enthusiastic and representative body of men assembled within its time-honored and sacred walls, says the Woodstock Republican.

Faster Time to Denver.

NEW GAME LAWS
State Regulations for Hunting During Different Seasons.

The new game law for Illinois as passed by the last legislature was one of the measures signed by Governor Deneen and is of wide interest in this country.

The hunting of quail is prohibited between September 20 and November 10, making the days for hunting of quail forty; partridges and prairie chickens may not be killed for the next four years; woodcocks cannot be dispatched between December 1st and August 1; gray foxes and squirrels, black, between January 1 and July 1; snipe and plover between May 1 and September 1.

Geese, duck, brant, and other water fowl may not be slaughtered for commercial purposes, the greatest number it is permissible to kill in a single day being 35 by any one person; the season is closed between April 15 and September 1; it is unlawful to hunt them between sunset and sunrise of any day, and the use of artificial blinds above water, sink boats, swivel guns, etc., is prohibited, as is also their killing from a sail, gasoline, steam or electric boat.

To increase the state game protection fund there is a license issued that costs seventy-five cents with a fee of twenty-five cents for the village or town clerk who issues it. Non residents of Illinois can hunt in season on payment of \$15.

The Mission of Quick Transit.
Rural society will take on a different aspect when the rapid transit systems of the interior are fully developed. The chief drawback to country life in the past has been the distance of country dwellers from the city and from one another. This is a land of great distances, but with the trolley, good roads and the automobile distance is doomed to annihilation.

The steam railroads have been wonderful developers in spots. They have scattered the people in isolated colonies. The trolleys and the automobile will bring the people together between the great steam centers. There are now more than a score of electric roads in this country operating in localities where there are a number of prosperous cities or towns within a radius of from ten to thirty miles of one another, varying in length from twenty to eighty miles. Although the steam roads have the advantage in speed, the trolleys compete with them on short distances because they carry passengers very near to the spots where they want to go.

Russian despotism does not scruple to tamper with foreign diplomatic mail, and the German government has established its own messenger service from the frontier to St. Petersburg. It is understood that the American ambassador has taken a similar precaution to safeguard his official correspondence.
