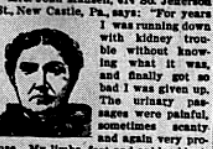

The Klondike proper—that is, that portion of the Yukon territory in the vicinity of Dawson—as far as the individual miner is concerned, is on a rapid decline owing to the immense area of ground being acquired by dredging companies. One company alone has purchased nearly all the placer ground on the three principal creeks, namely: Bonanza, Eldorado and Hunker, and has bonded considerably more on Dominion and other creeks for various reasons. Where formerly hundreds of miners were working for wages or working their own ground, thus creating a demand for provisions, clothing, machinery, hardware, etc., and the transportation from Dawson to the different mining operations, now dredges are either operating or in course of construction.—Consular Reports.

DARK KIDNAPING PLOT

ORCHARD TELLS OF SCHEME TO STEAL CHILDREN.

LAYS IT TO DAVID COATES

Explains the Poverty That Drove Him to Mean Crimes—Cross-Examination Reaches Steunenberg Murder.

Boise, Idaho.—The defense Wednesday carried the cross-examination of Harry Orchard down to the actual crime charged against Frank D. Haywood—the murder of William Steunenberg—and as it progressed assailed the testimony and the theory of the state resting upon it.

The Steunenberg crime was reached at midday, and counsel for the defense directed their efforts to an attempt to cloud the earlier purposes and movements of Orchard with uncertainty and indefiniteness. Then they emphasized the abandonment of all effort to kill after Orchard first tracked Steunenberg to a hotel in Boise and, with a skeleton key, had gained entrance of the very room in which Steunenberg was living. Here they delayed for a moment to prove that Orchard twice wrote and once telegraphed to Bill Eastery at Silver City to urge him to come and join in the crime, and the direct implication was that Orchard was endeavoring to involve another federation man into the crime which would bring discredit and dishonor to the organization.

Then the Steunenberg crime was temporarily thrust into the background, the witness carried over into his long journey into southern Idaho and his crimes there, including the dark plot to kidnap and hold for ransom the Paulson children, were forced upon the attention of the jury. David Coates, former business partner of Orchard, and then a publisher in Wallace, Idaho, first suggested the kidnaping to Pettibone and himself at Denver.

Then the defense showed the witness in the commission of a series of mean crimes and reduced to poverty, borrowing and trying to live for a long period.

The defense wanted to know why, if he were in Idaho on a mission of murder for Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone, and so on, he would not do them, he did not send to them for more money, instead of borrowing and stealing.

Orchard replied that he did send a letter to Moyer, Denver, and got \$100, but he did not send for more because he was temporarily off the Steunenberg murder errand and away from the money. Steunenberg lived, and he did not want to see for more money, or he could show that he was back to work.

PRESIDENT AT SAGAMORE HILL. Oyster Bay Gives the Roosevelts a Hearty Welcome.

Oyster Bay, N. Y.—President Roosevelt and his family are at home at Sagamore Hill. The trip from Washington, which was begun Wednesday morning in a drizzling rain, ended in sunshine at 10 o'clock in the afternoon. At Jersey City and Long Island City crowds surrounded the car, shouting greetings to the president, and when the train drew in here the station platform was thronged with neighbors, who extended Oyster Bay's usual demonstrative welcome.

After both the president and Mrs. Roosevelt had shaken hands with the forty-entire family, came a carriage and were driven to Sagamore Hill. A chorus of cheers followed them.

INVADERS ARE DRIVEN BACK. Salvador's Army Defeats the Nicaraguans and Revolutionists.

Mexico City.—According to a cablegram received in this city late Wednesday afternoon, the Salvadoran army has defeated the invading forces which captured the port of Acapulco Tuesday and has driven them back to the coast.

One of the leaders of the invading army was John Boissac, a former resident of San Francisco and an American citizen. He is reported to have been captured by the forces of President Figueroa.

Explorer Butchered in Liberia. Berne, Switzerland.—The government has received information of the murder in the Hinterland of Liberia of Walter Voiz, the well-known Swiss explorer. Voiz was captured by natives, fettered and imprisoned in a hut in which he was burned alive. A portion of his charred body was recovered.

Severe Storm in Indiana. Evansville, Ind.—Another severe wind and electrical storm passed over southern Indiana Wednesday afternoon, doing much damage.

Sues to Preserve Indian Graves. Leavenworth, Kan.—Lydia B. Conley filed a suit in the United States circuit court here Wednesday to enjoin Secretary of the Interior from disturbing the graves in the Huron cemetery, Kansas City, Kan., an old Indian burying ground. Following an act of congress, Secretary Conley recently appointed three commissioners to sell the property, and the effect of the suit will be to tie up the sale. Miss Conley is a descendant of the Wyandotte Indians and a lawyer.
