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## Water Rent Due.

The water rent for sprinkling laws is due and must be paid before the water is used for this purpose. You are liable to a fine for violating this rule. The hours for sprinkling are from 6 to 9 o'clock in the morning and 5 to 7:30 in the evening. For violating this section of the water ordinance a penalty of not less than five dollars or more than twenty dollars is provided for the first offense.
