The petition relates that all of the defendants are engaged in integratate trade and commerce in gran powder and high explosives and new violating the set of July 2, 1359, commonly thoward as the Sherman auth-truits act. the act of July 2, 1186, commonly known as the Sherman anti-trust act? It seeks to prevent and resirain the unlawful existing agreements, continuous, combinations and conspiracies in restraint of such trade and commerce, to prevent and restrain the attempts on the part of the glefendants to monopolies such trade and commerce, and to dissolve the existing monopolies such trade and commerce, and to dissolve the existing monopolies thereia.

The court is asked to determine whether public interests will be better subserved by the appointment of receivers to take possession of the property of the alleged trust with a view to bringing about conditions in trade and commerce that will be in harmony with the law. The prayer in this re-

ery or the alleged trust with a view to bringing about conditions in trade and commerce that will be in harmony with the law. The prayer in this respect is identical with that in the so-called tobacco trust petition.

Complete Menopoly Alleged. The defendants, it is alleged, already have a complete menopoly of the production and distribution of smokeless ordinance powder in addition to the monopoly of 55 per cent. of the production and distribution of high explosives other than smoteless powder. The government asks, in its prayer for relief, that these operating companies be enjoined and restrained from operating and esgading in intertate commerce in the United States or that receivers be appointed to take over their business.
