CONSPIRACY THE CHARGE

Federal Grand Jury at Minneapolis Returns True Bill as Result of "Little Black Book" Probe.

Minneapolis, Minn.—As a result of its investigation of the so-called "little black book" the federal grand jury Tuesday returned 19 indictments against well-known lumber men and officers of the Northwestern Lumbermen's association, charging conspiracy to defraud by the use of the mails.

The indictment named in the indictment were: Ralph Burasda, who is president of the Northwestern Lumbermen's association, and of the Hawkeye Lumber company, of Oskosh, Ia.; W. O. Hollis, of Minneapolis, secretary of the Western Lumbermen's association; George C. Ingram, of Sauk Center, a director in the association; Stanley Moore, of Waterloo, Ia., director; C. E. Groff, of Eldon, Ia., up to last year vice president of the association; Theo. E. McLaughlin, general manager of the Phoenix Lumber company, of Minneapolis; Leonard Keller, vice president of the North Star Lumber company; George P. Thompson, secretary and treasurer of the North Star Lumber company; E. Hudson, vice president and active manager of the Central Lumber company, of Minneapolis; I. Nesbit, treasurer of the Wisconsin Lumber company, of general manager of the Wisconsin Lumber company; Rufus Clark, general manager of the J. H. Quaal Lumber company, of Minneapolis; R. P. French, of Hawarden, Ia., vice president of the J. H. Quaal Lumber company; W. J. H. Rogers, manager of the Bruce-Edgerton Lumber company, of Minneapolis; J. W. Lucas, of Hayes-Lucas Lumber company, of Winona; O. H. Botford, general manager of the "Laid Norton" yard, of Winona; A. R. Rogers, president of the Rogers Lumber company, of Minneapolis; George H. Rogers, vice president of the Rogers Lumber company; N. S. Darling, president of the Oklahoma Sash and Door factory, of Oklahoma, Okla.

SHANGHAI WELCOMES TAFT.

Shanghai.—Secretary of War William H. Taft is expected to arrive here Tuesday from the steamer Minnesota, which is conveying him from Japan to Manila. The Chinese and the foreign residents of Shanghai unite in giving the distinguished visitor the heartiest welcome that ever has been extended to a foreign statesman.

Tuesday afternoon Mr. Taft dedicated the building of the Young Men's Christian association. At four o'clock the secretary was given an elaborate reception by the Chinese residents. This reception marked an epoch in the matter of the status of women in China, for Chinese women of aristocratic families were present at the function and even presided at the tables, when they served refreshments. This is the first time such a thing has happened in China. The American residents gave a banquet to the secretary in the evening.

FIRST TEST RIDE IS TAKEN.

Army Officers Make Trying "Hike" on Virginia Roads.

Washington.—The first test ride by army officers, which was ordered by President Roosevelt to determine the horsemanhood of those of higher rank than captain, started from Fort Myer at two p. m. Tuesday, and two and a half hours later the party, 25 in number, was back at the fort, having traversed something over 15 miles of good and bad Virginia roads.

New Court Clash Threatened.

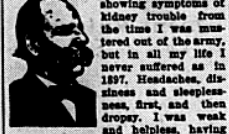
Montgomery, Ala.—Prospects for a clash between the state and federal courts lie in the refusal of the Central of Georgia, at the meeting of the railroad commission Tuesday, to go into the question of rates on cotton to compress, on the ground that this is one of the rates enjoyed by the federal court. The commission decided that it could regulate the rate and at once went into the taking of evidence, though protest was made by officers of the Central of Georgia.

Receive Infernal Machines.

Denver, Col.—Gov. Henry A. Buchtel, David H. Moffat, president of the First National bank of Denver, and Charles E. Kountze, president of the Colorado National bank, had received through the mails Tuesday infernal machines containing sufficient dynamite to have caused great destruction of lives and property. Fortunately the machines had been given to the recipients by Chief of Post Police Michael Delaney, who had obtained a confession from Kemp V. Siglow, by whom they were mailed.

ON A MACKEREL SCHOONER.

Daily Routine in the Life of the Gloucester Fishermen.

The routine life on a mackerel schooner is not strenuous. The crew consists of 14 men, a skipper and cook. Two men constitute a watch, one aloft as a lookout, the other at the wheel, so that each man has two hours on duty, and then 12 hours off, before his turn comes around again. During this period he may be called on to shorten sail, wash the deck or perform other work. Half of the crew have their banks forward with the cook, who is king of the forecastle, and the rest sleep aft with the captain. We were assigned to a double bunk aft, where we were not troubled with galley smells, but had to be on our good behavior. All the rolls and revels were forward. The crew ate in two shifts, the older men with the skipper.—Travel Magazine.

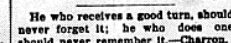

Chiropodist's Prescription.

A lotion and powder for tender and swollen feet: One teaspoonful of boracic acid to one pint of grain alcohol. After bathing the feet in lukewarm water, spray them with the lotion used in an atomizer, and fan until dry. The effect is delightful. Then rub over the foot this powder, or put it in the stocking:

Powdered starch, 35 grains; oil of bergamot, ten drops; oil of lavender, 8 drops; oil of wintergreen, 16 drops. Mix well, and pass through a sieve. Excellent.—National Magazine.

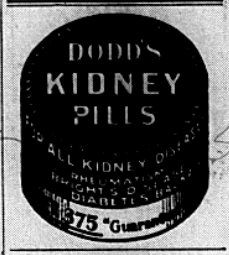
