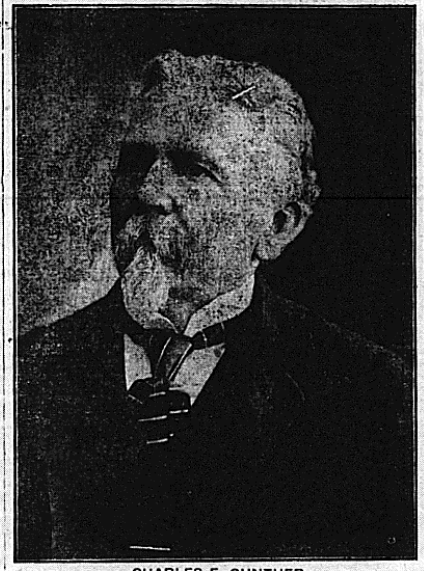

OUR NEXT SENATOR



It Looks as if Olson Would Carry Lake, McHenry and Boone.

HAS MADE RAPID GAINS

Hon. Edward D. Shurtleff's Attack on Him Fell Flat. Only Helped His Popularity

There is no disputing the fact that the sentiment of voters in Lake county, is strongly in favor of the candidacy of Honorable A. J. Olson...

There is not a township in the whole of Lake county that will not give Mr. Olson a good vote...

He has done more active campaign work during the present campaign than all his opponents put together...

To show something of the feeling in the northern part of Lake county we publish the enclosed from the Antioch News of July 21st:

"The nearer we approach to the primaries the more evident it is that Honorable A. J. Olson of Woodstock will receive the nomination for State Senator."

"This is apparent from the fact that Mr. Olson will carry his home county by a large majority and will also receive a big vote in Lake county."

"Mr. Olson is a hustler and has visited every city, village, milk station and hamlet, called on individuals everywhere, and has been received with favor wherever he has been, and the encouragement he has received is a sure indication of his popularity."

"The farmers of the entire district are confident that this county will give Mr. Olson the largest vote for Senator of any candidate in the field."

"From the best reports that can be obtained throughout the entire district, we predict the nomination of Mr. Olson for State Senator by a large majority."

"The Woodstock Republican the leading paper of Mr. Olson's home city gave a lengthy review last week of the Senatorial situation, and said: 'Although he feels sure of receiving the nomination he will 'hustle' till the last vote is counted.'"

"Many of his friends believe his vote in the district will equal the entire vote of the other three candidates."

"If my name appeared as a Cook county delegate to any convention after the primaries for Governor in 1904, it was without my knowledge or consent; but, in 1904, I was elected a delegate to the state convention, although I did not seek or seek the position, and did not know I was on the ticket as a delegate until a few days before the primaries."

"No one then questioned my right to sit, and I had not at that time ever voted in McHenry county."

"Mr. Shurtleff makes another false statement when he says that I cast my first vote in McHenry county on November 4, 1905, in defiance of law. I had resided here continuously since the spring of 1903, and was then a legal voter of Woodstock."

"I voted at the Smiley-Gilmore primaries, in August, 1905, which can be proved by Judge Smiley, whom I supported, and neither candidate or their supporters then questioned my right to vote, as everyone in and around the city of Woodstock knows that I, and my family have no other home or domicile of any kind, than our home in the City of Woodstock, since September of 1903, and that for years prior to that time I and my family lived in Woodstock eight months of each year."

"The statement of Mr. Shurtleff that I am in the fight for State Senator 'at

the request of Governor Charles F. Deussen' is a malicious lie, and made by him to get Yates men to vote for me and Mench for State Senator."

"I told Mr. Shurtleff at his Chicago office, in the presence of a reliable witness, before announcing my candidacy, that if he wanted to run for the State Senator from this district, I would not be a candidate, but would support him."

"I challenge Mr. Shurtleff, or any of his friends, to produce one person in either Cook, McHenry, Lake or Boone counties that I have asked to vote for Governor Deussen or against Richard Yates."

"I ask Mr. Shurtleff to prove to the voters of this district a few of the many false charges he and Mench have made so promiscuously before making any other."

Calcutta Talks Fifty-seven Ways. Calcutta is one of the most polyglot capitals in the world. The last census shows fifty-seven languages are spoken in it. Not many of these, of course, are spoken by large sections of its million inhabitants...

I have many friends in both Lake and Boone counties who are working earnestly for my nomination and have been since I became a candidate, but I am in no way to blame if Mr. Shurtleff is disappointed in not getting them to desert me, nor am I to blame because many voters in both counties have refused to give Mr. Shurtleff their support."

"The further statement of Mr. Shurtleff that if an elected State Senator I will furnish a vote at the command of any Chicago machine or combine, is untrue and ridiculous in the extreme, as Mr. Shurtleff must know by this time that I do not take orders in any manner. Mr. Shurtleff did the instructions of the people of this district and the whole state in regard to the passage of a primary law."

"The other statement of Shurtleff that in the earlier part of May I attempted to buy the State Senatorship by getting all opposition out of the way is as untrue as it is foolish. It can be proved by Judge C. H. Donnelly, C. Z. Hendricks of Harvard, and others, that I was called out of bed and asked by the Judge to come to the court house at 10 o'clock at night, where Mench then sat there in the presence of Mr. Hendricks and other responsible persons told me that he had withdrawn from the race for state senator in my favor, and that he would support me, and this was not done by Mench until he had conferred with me that very day and evening with Shurtleff and his other friends from different parts of the county."

"The other statement that 'through my newspapers' and personally through the district I have made the issue that Mr. Shurtleff must be defeated because he was supporting Mench for State Senator, is also maliciously false."

"I do not own any newspaper or any interest in any, and I have not asked anyone to vote or work against his candidacy."

"Mr. Shurtleff claims I should be defeated solely because I seek an office that was promised by him and others to Mench several years ago, in violation of the people's right to nominate a senator, and I leave it to the voters of the district to decide on August 8th whether E. D. Shurtleff et al or the voters are to make the nominations."

"Lake and Boone counties have each had the senatorship since it was held by a sufficient county and requires less of the custom which Shurtleff has for years insisted must be kept, McHenry county is this time entitled to the Senatorship. No complaint of this twenty-year custom was made by Shurtleff until after I became a candidate and then until Mench had re-entered the race for State Senator (after withdrawing) and Shurtleff had himself become a candidate for the Lower House."

"Mr. Shurtleff saw the old established custom must be broken in order to give him an excuse for entering the race for the Lower House."

"Mr. Shurtleff's claim that he and Mench should both be elected, would deprive either Lake or Boone of a house member, which would be contrary to the custom followed by Shurtleff heretofore, and in my judgment contrary to justice."

"I am willing that the voters of this district should judge my record in the legislature by comparison with the record by Shurtleff on the primary law and other legislation without further comment."

### AN ASPHALT ROAD.

New Jersey to Experiment With Mixture of That Product With Dirt. The New Jersey state Department of highways is to construct in Mercer county an experimental mile of a new automobile road, the plans for which State Road Supervisor Robert A. Meeker recently obtained in Kansas City.

Mr. Meeker says the new method of construction is simple and cheap, that it is self-healing when broken and therefore practically indestructible, that it improves with age, that it is mud-free and almost dust-free, that it is not slippery even when coated with ice.

In the building of the road the original soil is finely pulverized, and then into this there is worked a mixture of hot asphalt, the whole mass being firmly rolled in the finishing. Breaks are quickly repaired by traffic, the weight of wheels cementing them together. The base yields slightly to heavy traffic, and then repairs its original shape. It is equally good for horses and automobiles.

If the experiment proves a success, it is likely that the result will be a radical change in the road building methods of the state of New Jersey, with the substitution of asphalt for the macadam process now used.

Million a Year For Roads. Connecticut will lead in the good roads movement as a state. She was the third to get into it, New Jersey being the first, four years before her, and Massachusetts the second, in 1898. Now Connecticut spends \$1,000,000 a year, while the first spends but \$200,000 and the second but \$100,000 less than that. Connecticut spends the largest amount per capita for good roads by far, the only other states whose total annual appropriations are larger being New York, with \$5,000,000, and Pennsylvania, with \$15,000,000, but both states are vastly larger than little Connecticut.

Bad Roads, Indeed. It is no wonder that the grangers are speaking pieces in favor of better roads, as the mud is something formidable on the country roads. At East Longmeadow, Mass., one of the churches was closed on recent Sunday on account of the muddy condition of the roads, says the Hartford Times.

A Hartford municipal party, driving to Cromwell, found the roads impossible to take to the fields. The milkmen and farmers declare that they "never saw the best of it," and the chauffeur who
