L. Zurich Grade School is Given Superior Rating

State Superintendent Dedicates Institution to Higher Rank

An event of which Lake Zurich can be justly proud occurred on Tuesday evening, March 23, when 250 parents and friends gathered at the elementary school No. 95 to witness the dedicatory exercises that added the school to the relatively small group of superior schools in the state of Illinois.

The exercises opened with a prayer by the Rev. E. A. Iron following which a program was given by the pupils of the school. This consisted of a violin solo by Arletta Loomis, a saxophone solo by Frank Herbick, a piano number by Marilyn Prehm, and a trio, played by Arletta Loomis, Frank Herbick and Mrs. Herbick. This trio swung into a march which whirled onto the platform the entire school body, which took over the remainder of the program.

Songs of welcome were sung by the distinguished guests present. The history of the school was given by Donald Young. The flag was brought in and saluted. The "Blue Flag" was given by four youngest grades, and "Your Flag" by the five next grades. The four oldest grades sang "Your Flag and My Flag," and the whole school body recited "My Flag," which was a fine pledge of American citizenship. This part of the program was concluded by a well-rehearsed wand drill by eight little girls from the second to the sixth grades.

The chairman of the school board, Charles Rudinski, next introduced W. C. Petty, superintendent of schools in Lake county, who in turn, in a few well-chosen words, introduced the principal speaker of the evening, the Hon. Francis G. Blair, superintendent of public instruction for the state of Illinois.

Mr. Blair's speech was a tribute to the vision, the preparation, the unflinching loyalty and devotion to duty, which on the part of both the school board and the teachers, are wholly responsible for the high rank it has achieved.

"You cannot expect or maintain a superior school without superior teachers," Mr. Blair stated. "A scrub teacher never lays, and never will create a superior school."

Mr. Blair complimented the parents and the citizens of Lake Zurich who have been so aware of the necessity of great class school in the community.

At the close of Mr. Blair's speech he presented to Edward Young, clerk of the school board, the diploma which certifies the advance of the school to the superior rank, and also an outside market for the building, which in large gilt letters reads, "Superior School."

The evening closed with a social hour when Mrs. Albert Prehm, assisted by Mesdames Bauer, Goring, Warren, Clements, Blau, Iron, Rudinski, Young, Bensch, Dohman, Giese and Gehlke served a delicious lunch. Opportunity was given visitors to inspect exhibits of the pupils' work.

Charles Rudinski, Herman Borsching, and Edward Young are members of the school board and the faculty consist of Mrs. Deer Jensen and Mrs. Albert Herbick.

Great Lakes Plan for Unemployment Relief Will Not Be Worked Out

The unemployment relief plan of utilizing the Great Lakes Naval training station for housing and providing civilian training for young men will probably go by the boards.

The committee of the station, offering a plan to the administration for giving youth of the Middle West lodging, board and a small amount of pay along with character building training. This was for the purpose of removing the youths from the ranks of the unemployed. However, the house of representatives has voted down a similar and more sweeping proposal for any camps. It is assumed that the navy proposal will also be dropped.

Efforts may be made to secure an authorization from congress for the enlistment of a sufficient number of young men to fill existing vacancies in the naval service.

Such a proposal would be a more permanent contribution toward the solution of the unemployment problem, and at the same time, would greatly increase the efficiency and value of the navy.

The quota of recruits to be transferred to the Great Lakes station during the next two months will be doubled, according to word received from the navy department by Rear Admiral Wat Tyler Cluett, the commandant. This will result in 170 recruits being received each month in the local training station and will substantially increase the present number under training, which has dropped to 420.

State Is Going to Get Its Drag on Beer Sale

The state must have a definite and substantial revenue from the sale of beer, Governor Horner has declared and local communities should have the right to establish local option areas. The governor has suggested a license fee of \$100 yearly on establishments which will sell beer to be consumed either on the premises or elsewhere. Such a fee going to the state, it was estimated, would bring in between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000 yearly.
