## Tired Eyes Overheated; Should Rest, Bathe Them

Long, continued use of the eyes should be avoided by a rest at intervals, if only for a few minutes, bathing them with ordinary cold water from the faucet.

Dr. Rosenblatt explains to "Eye Hygiene and Heat," an article contributed by him to Higon, that it is the best generator over a long period by excessive use of the eyes that causes them to become tired. He says:

"Heat affects the eyes in numerous ways. The heat generated by excessive use of the eyes over long hours, added to the ordinary body heat; of fever repeated over a period of years; the heat of brilliant sunlight or too intense artificial light; and the heat of furnaces over a period of time are detrimental to the function of the eyes.

"Nature provides a safeguard in a manner somewhat similar in that of the water-cooled motor. Transparent fluids are circulated within the eye, and an anterior surface of the eye is bathed with fluid coming down from the tear-land above the eye.

"The peculiar special function of the eye requires transparency, and excessive heat destroys that quality; the loss of transparency is fatal to the function of that special organ, even though its form and strength are fully retained."

## Wood Lighter Than Cork; Is Better for Airplanes

The use of balsa wood in the manufacture of airplane models has aroused considerable curiosity in the minds of users of this commodity, particularly because of its light weight. It has the reputation of being lighter than cork. Inquiry as to the comparative weights of the balsa cork to Forest Products Laboratories of Canada brought the following reply:

"The average run of balsa wood probably weighs from 7 1/2 to 12 lb. per cubic foot, air-dry, although abnormal material will occasionally be found outside this range. Such balsa wood has been tested, however, in the neighborhood of 8 pounds per cubic foot. It

## Pawnbroker's Sign Traced to the City of Florence

The three gilded balls which are often used as the indication of a pawnbroker's shop may be traced to the City of Florence many centuries ago. The business of lending money for profit is very old, and the establishment of such shops was an important part of the enterprise carried on by the powerful Medici family during the Middle Ages.

This family rose to wealth and influence by successful commercial ventures, and continued to combine the career of merchants and bankers with the exercise of political power. It was in all probability the importance of the Medici in money matters that led the money-lenders to adopt the Medici coat-of-arms, of which were three gilt balls. Some authorities say that the three balls represent three pigs, in a punning allusion to the profession of medicine by the Medici family.

### Crack in the Liberty Bell

The Liberty Bell cracked on July 8, 1835, while being tolled for the coronation of Charles John Marshall, who had died in Philadelphia two days earlier, were being taken from the city. The crack is supposed to have been due to a defect in the bell dating from the day it was cast. In 1861 it was proposed to ring the Liberty Bell on George Washington's birthday, and in preparing for the occasion the crack was drilled out to separate the parted sides, with a view of improving the sound. But the experiment was not successful. This account for the unusual width of the crack.
