## Conservation of Fox River Valley Beauty Is Sought

### Representative Points Out Unlimited Possibilities for Beauty Spot

Asking that the state take into account the beauty of the Fox River and the 51 miles running through the valley in LaSalle and McHenry counties, in order to determine how the natural resources and beauty of the district can best be conserved, State Representative Richard J. Taylor, McHenry, introduced a resolution in the house.

The resolution provided for a committee of six to be named from the house and three from the senate, to make a study and survey of the Fox river lake region.

Such a commission, in the language of the resolution, "shall recommend laws and recommendations, together with any needed legislation in the public general assembly."

The Lyon resolution states a four-fold purpose for its passage:

1. That the Fox river lake region has unexplored possibilities for recreation, consisting in a) a 51 lakes and thousands of acres of wooded land and vast lakes both of fame and beauty.
2. The opportunities for hunting, fishing and swimming are unexplored.
3. It lies in close proximity to the metropolitan area of Chicago and is readily accessible for the recreation of that area for vacation and convalescence purposes.
4. That the natural resources of this marvelous lake region are necessary to the health and happiness of a large portion of the state's population.

## Lake County Cows Make High Production Records

Two cows in the herd of August Zewang of Deardorf have just finished their new official records for production which entitles them to entry in the Advanced Register of the American Guernsey Cattle club. These animals include three-year-old African Mast of Thoro, BH 20741 with a production of 12894.5 pounds of milk and 578 pounds of fat in class E, and a record holder of Thoro Hill, 286249 with a production of 10871.5 pounds of milk and 485.5 pounds of fat in class F.

A cow in the herd of A. D. Lasker of Everett has just finished a new official record for production which entitles her to entry in the Advanced Register of the American Guernsey Cattle club. This animal is four-year-old Wendenore 2041259 with a production of 14824 pounds of milk and 779.6 pounds of fat in class C.
