The board of directors representing the corporation is to be composed of representatives of the creditors and of the stockholders.

It is concluded that a receiver will be appointed to liquidate the whole of the bank.

The liquidation of the bank will be a community affair and it is believed that a great deal of good will be done for the people and the creditors of the bank.

Mr. Shaw has been designated as liquidator of the bank. Under the proposed scheme a liquidating committee will be appointed by the stockholders of the new corporation.

With perhaps one assistant and one or two clerks, Mr. Shaw will take up the work of the liquidation.

It is also possible that through the aid of the liquidating committee a large amount of the bank's real estate may be sold at a profit.
