Two Legislators Are Not in Favor of New Sales Tax

Paddock and Carroll Object; Others in District Are Undecided

Two legislators in this district have come out against the proposed new sales tax. Representative William H. Paddock and Senator J. Carroll have both expressed their opposition to the measure.

Carroll, a veteran in the house, has four reasons for his opposing the proposed sales tax.

1. The only reason advanced for the tax is that it is for the unemployed, and the government is taking care of them.

2. Each copy derived and is expending the paper, and has not been one dollar for unemployed relief.

3. Such counties as do not need relief will be unable to obtain proper financing unless the state collects the tax.

4. It does not provide a substitute for general property taxes, thereby resulting in an increase in the latter.

Budget directors of the recent session have not approved the proposed 2 percent tax.

"Frankly I do not decided what my position will be on the new sales tax bill. I will try to review any suggestions as to how revenue can be provided for other needs during the coming month."

Senator Phillips explained that he voted for the sales tax with the understanding that the money so received should be used as a replacement of school taxes unless the county board of supervisors for a two-thirds vote ordered a different purpose.

"I supported the bill believing that it would relieve the necessity of a portion of the burden that they are forced to carry. The new bill in its present form provides that the funds collected from this source will go into the general revenue fund. If that is the final form of the bill, I will not support it, as it does not provide a replacement feature."

Creation of New Precincts Is Up to County Board

The record vote of more than 50,000 persons in Lake county who went to the polls in the November election will make it necessary for the county board of supervisors, now in session, to create some new precincts in the county, possibly as many as 10 more.

Under the present districting there are 75 precincts.

Cuba township had more than 1200 votes last fall and will need dividing and Washington precincts 2, 8, 10 and 25 brought out far more votes than are supposed to be cast in a precinct. The law set 800 votes as the maximum.

Warren township cast 947 votes at the last general election and will need two precincts instead of one, in the opinion of Supervisor L. E. Pohlen, and Warren, who has asked for a division of the township.

On the other hand, Benton residents as well as Supervisor William Pocklington, of Benton township, have asked that the number of precincts there be decreased from three to two. In Benton 2 there are less than 100 votes, according to the petition and the supervisor, and in view of this the district is unnecessary.

Only Defeat Loses Election Control for Lake G. O. P.'s

Gubernatorial Winner Used as Basis for Selection of Election Judges

For the first time in history the Republican party will hold control of the election machinery in Lake county to the Democratic party if the present opinion of State's Attorney Charles E. Mason is approved by the county board of supervisors in session this week.

Mason ruled that each party was entitled to the majority of judges in precincts in which their gubernatorial candidates carried in the November 8, 1932 election. Governor Henry Horner carried 58 precincts in the county for the democrats and Lee Small II, republican, for the republicans. He defeated Governor Horner was the only democrat to carry the county last November.

Mason held that the county board selects the judges, and that the democratic members appoint their appointees subject to the approval of the board as a whole, and that the republican members appoint their judges subject to the approval of the entire board.

If the Mason opinion is followed it will give the democrats 133 election judges in the county and control in 58 precincts and the republicans 92 election judges and control in 17 precincts.

Artificial Respiration Saves Chicago Boy After Near-Drowning at Lake

Artificial respiration applied for an hour Sunday afternoon revived Eldon Dorn, 11 years old, who had sunk in a deep hole at the foot of a water slide on Slocum last near Wauconda. Witnesses said the boy went off the slide into the deep hole and did not come to the surface until hauled out by rescuers whose names were not learned. It was reported that he had been under the water for nearly five minutes before being brought to the surface.

The boy, the son of Edward Dorn, lives with his father at 3017 Patterson avenue, Chicago. He was visiting with friends over the weekend at the resort lake.

Unconscious, young Dorn was rushed to Dr. Ross' emergency hospital in Wauconda and was finally revived after resuscitation work lasting about an hour.
