## Waukegan Paupers Will Not Work if Dole Is in Sight

### Emergency Relief Official Scores Lawfers in Towns of East Lake County

The Chicago towns of Lake county, which received the most money nearly all of the poor relief money going to the country districts, according to the Waukegan Review of the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission, are at least \$200,000 from the Illinois Emergency Relief for its July quota. The amount equals that received in June.

Except Cook, Will and Mason counties, Lake county received the biggest share of any county in the state, although several others are more populous.

The biggest part of the "dole" is eaten up by Waukegan township, according to figures obtained from the county clerk.

The Waukegan office of the Lake Shore, with the exception of Libertyville township, are not supporting their part without help from the relief commission.

"In the farming communities the people are more frugal, seemingly more industrious, and more concerned in their own welfare," said L. R. Rogers, chief of the directors of the relief bureau, said.

Rogers admitted that he was a little disgruntled in the progress being made among the unemployed in Waukegan. Some, he said, admit work without receiving any kind that they do not feel inclined to work as long as they can receive a living from the community.

"What to do with people of this frame of mind, it is not known, but it looks a lot like it if some are feeling the influence of Mary Old Knight and looking for a dollar rather than work that would make them independent of pauper relief," Rogers said.
