## "One Eye" Connelly Operated at County Hospital, Improved

## Famous Gate Crasher Recupersing at Lake County Institution

One Eye Connelly, world famous gate crasher, who was operated for a cataract at the Lake County hospital last Thursday, is showing enough improvement to warrant the prediction that he will recover.

Connelly, who claims the distinction of having viewed every major professional sporting event in the world in the last 10 or 12 years with out paying an admission, was in Waukegan Thursday when he became ill with acute appendicitis.

Connelly had been at the hospital for some time but had never been able to eat and had been around the world eight times. He had never had a ticket to anything but had seen every event he was able to attend.

Connelly, who is 60 years old, is a native of New York and has been a resident of Chicago for many years. He is a well known figure in the sporting world and has been a frequent visitor to the city.

Connelly's condition was critical and he was little hope that he would recover.

## 53,429 Bushels Wheat Quota for Lake County

Large wheat quota for Lake County is announced by the federal agricultural administration, according to word which Farm Adviser H. C. Gilchrist, has just received from R. H. Henderson, acting state manager in the extension service of the college of agriculture, University of Illinois. The allotment is approximately 53,429 bushels for the county. This is the percentage of the national wheat crop which is estimated domestically as human food.

On the basis of these official allotments, each competition producer in Lake county should receive an average from what production will total approximately \$18,000. It is estimated by area Adviser H. C. Gilchrist. The bushel rate for the competition payments has not yet been fixed. Two-thirds of the total allotment to cooperating growers will be paid this fall, and the remaining amount spring after satisfactory proof of average reduction.

The total amount of the compensation payments which will come to the county in the form of ready cash will depend upon the number of wheat growers who take advantage of the opportunity to participate in the wheat program, it was pointed out.
