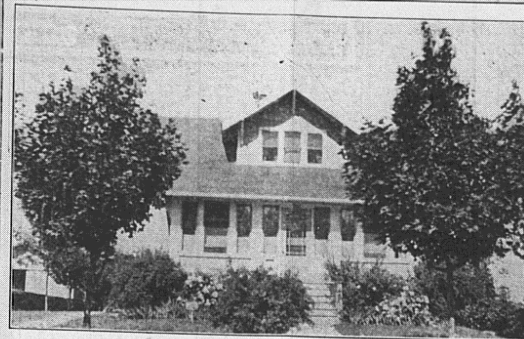
Barrington Children

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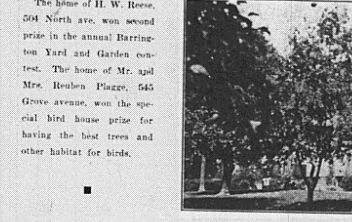

Barrington General Hospital Keeps Operating Despite Falling Off of Patronage at Larger Institutions

On August 15, 1933, the Barrington General Hospital will be able to celebrate its sixth anniversary. It was founded on August 15, 1928, by Miss Nellie M. Berghorn, graduate nurse, and has been located ever since at 103 East Lincoln avenue. Although the five beds available at this hospital have not been sufficient at times to serve the demands of the community, the hospital is in general well able to provide for the medical requirements of the residents.
