Bishop John S. Stamm of Kansas City, at the opening exercises of the 60th annual 11-day encampment of the Evangelical church of Chicago and surrounding areas to be held at the Barrington park grounds on Hillside avenue from Friday, Aug. 18, until Monday, Aug. 28. In addition to giving the opening address, Bishop Stamm will preside over the conferees of the southwest Episcopal area, will preside Saturday and Sunday evenings.

The distinguished speaker for the week beginning Monday, Aug. 21, is Dr. E. W. Prater of Cleveland, O., general secretary of the board of religious education. Dr. Prater will serve as leader of a series of Bible studies on the epistle to the Hebrews each morning, and will preach the evening sermon. Rev. G. D. Nye, an evangelist who will direct the studies throughout the week and there will be music by soloists and church choirs.

Barrington Road Is Open Between Routes 22 and 5 With the Barrington road paved and open south to Highway 5 (U. S. 20), motorists are making use of that big link with highways extending east state. Barrington has been removed from the road so that vehicles may go through, although the shoulder has not been built to the two-way street width. Road signs there now indicate one-way traffic traveling over that part of the road. The Barrington road now extends from Highway 22 to Highway 5, a distance of about 14 miles. The distance between Highway 22 and Highway 5 is 11 miles.
