First Day School Enrollment Three Less Than in '32

698 Reported; High School Shows Increase; Heat Disturbing

Old weather man was far from being friendly when he waffled a hot sun in the forecast for the opening day of school, making the return to books more to pleasant for the children. However, the first day enrollment of the Barrington public school totaled 698—just three short of the first day enrollment last year.

The rabbit and pheasant season will open as usual on November 5. The date of opening and the duration of the duck season has not been determined.

Interest in the decision to be announced soon regarding the opening of the migratory bird shooting in the first few weeks of the season has been especially in the southern and central parts of the state.

Several districts are expected to enroll during the week to bring the total over the 700 mark, judging from the fact that in the year 1932, 712 pupils have enrolled after the beginning of school. A comparison of first day enrollment figures follow:

The largest enrollment in any one grade was in the eighth grade in the junior high where 60 pupils registered.
