

Horton's Name
This old town, about which centered so much of the early history of our country, was named for Boston in England. That town grew up around a church which was founded in Lincolnshire by a Roman monk by the name of St. Botolph, or Botolph, who lived in Lincolnshire in the town of Boston. From the town in Lincolnshire there came to America Rev. John Cotton, who gave the name of Boston to the first settlement on the Massachusetts peninsula. Thus the Puritan settlement owed its name to a Roman Catholic saint and monk.

1500 Coins in Church Plate
Among 25,000 fatrings, valued at one-fourth of a cent each, collected for a church fund in Elizabeth, England, were those striking over 150 years and a Queen Elizabeth piece coin dated 1562.

Some Hard Winters
In 1200 the Baltic sea was crossed by sledges. In 1320 a great many persons were frozen to death in England. In 1400 the Danube was frozen from her source to her estuary in the Black sea. In 1460 all vines in France were killed by frost. In 1600 and 1620 the port of Marseilles was frozen over, and there was great suffering and distress. In 1700 France was frozen from north to south, the ice extending for miles seaward.

Thickness of Wire
Gold can be broken down so greatly that a piece the size of a 50 gold piece can be drawn out so fine that it would make a gold wire 50 miles long, and one twenty-thousandth of an inch thick, which means that it would be practically invisible. Copper wire can be drawn so fine that it will be one-third the thickness of a human hair and 25 miles long. It can be made out of a single pound of copper.

Plants Devour Animals
Persons who may have thought that ferocious plants which capture and devour animals exist only in stories and the minds of their children will be interested in a report by a representative of the bureau of plant industry. These plants and their victims, he says, are so small as to be seen only through microscopes. They form a jungle from which they capture their victims or limbs to capture the small worm-like animals as they pass along. The plant then releases a chemical strong enough to quickly dispose of the unlucky prisoner.

Some scholars believe that the Egyptians and the kindred Hamitic races migrated in prehistoric times from Asia to Africa while other scholars hold northern Africa to be the original home of the race. The people of Egypt are chiefly of mixed Arab and negro blood, but the Egyptian of pure blood is said to have much the same features as is to be found among nomads dating thousands of years back.

to be Installed as St. Matthew Pastor
Rev. A. T. Kretzmann, who has conducted services the past year at St. Matthew Evangelical church, will be installed as the regularly called pastor of that church in a special service to be held Sunday afternoon, Rev. D. H. Hennig, a founder of the local church and missionary-at-large of the Missouri Synod Lutheran church, has been appointed by the president of the synod to preach the sermon and administer the installation. He will be assisted by several neighboring pastors. The St. Matthew church, under the direction of Miss Rhia Jahnke, will sing several sections.

From graduating from Concordia Theological seminary in June, 1931, he was assigned to the local church at Forest Park in August of the same year.
