Wrangle Continues Over Public Works Projects

The latest communication in the mounting feud between Governor Horner and Secretary of the Interior Lewis is a telegram from the governor to the secretary requesting that the government remove the "red tape" of federal approval of the Illinois NRA road projects.

Secretary Lewis has accused the governor of laxity in preparing a road program for Illinois and the governor has retaliated by accusing the department of the interior of holding up the construction work by its slowness in approving the plans.

September Warmest on Record, Meteorologist Says

E. W. Holcomb, federal meteorologist for the Illinois section, recently issued the following report on September weather: "This month was not only nearly as warm as the preceding month, and the warmest September in the climatological history of Illinois, but it also made the average for the autumn months of 1933 the highest of any year except 1921 since the beginning of state-wide observations in 1878. There was also an unusual number of high day temperatures this autumn, as shown by the fact that at Springfield the record being 92 days in 1933.

A few places of business in Barrington will be closed Armistice Day, Nov. 11, but the majority will remain open throughout the day, according to advice from several local merchants. The post office will be open as usual and the Post-Newsweek office will be closed. Two of the other places of business will be open only part of the day. Due to the fact that the NRA has placed additional financial burdens on the majority of places of business, the proprietors do not feel that they can close their stores during a full Saturday, the busiest day of the week.
