90 Per Cent of Stockholders in Bank Agreement

Depositors Liquidating Group Report Progress at Meeting

Will nearly two years elapsed since the First State Bank of Barrington closed, depositors are about ready to take over the affairs of the institution through a formation of their proposed liquidating corporation, according to a statement prepared at a general meeting of depositors held at the village hall Tuesday night.

The plan which depositors at the meeting are confident they can carry out is a formation of a corporation of which A. J. Church is chairman. It calls for formation of a corporation with officers to be elected by the depositors. The corporation is to take over the frozen assets of the closed bank and liquidate them as quickly as possible. Shares of depositors will be issued to the amount of \$100,000, plus shares of common stock to the amount of \$100,000. The corporation will own the assets of the institution but will not until after their bank liabilities have been paid up 100 per cent.

Mr. Church reported that about 90 per cent of the stockholders have signed an agreement to pay their obligations to the bank. Under the plan of the proposed corporation, they will pay 1 per cent of their outstanding debt for the first year, 2 per cent per month for the second year and 3 per cent per month thereafter and their liabilities are paid.

Several depositors at the meeting expressed the opinion that bank stockholders should pay their obligations to the bank in full. Mr. Church declared that they accepted their debt freely when the bank was operating and that now when the picture has changed they should shoulder their obligations.

The obstacle in the way of completion of the corporation is the task of getting all depositors to sign the agreement. The depositors committee have started work on this with only a small percentage signed up. They do not contemplate liquidating their job in a few weeks. The \$100,000 will not be added to the \$100,000 until the liquidation work is done in such a way that the organization work is completed.

H. B. Brindlinger, who is working with the committee said that the next point will not work unless the depositors and after the corporation has been successfully organized, plenty of time and work will be necessary to complete liquidation. The entire job might be finished in three years, he said, although this would be done on general business conditions.

A sub-committee consisting of James M. and E. J. Piers who are among the heaviest depositors and H. A. Howland, A. J. Church, C. J. Bennett and H. B. Brindlinger, was appointed to meet next Tuesday night to go over the bank records and determine whether the assets would warrant acceptance of the plan.

A general meeting will be held on the following night. A report on the number of depositors signed up and percentage of total deposits represented is expected at that time.

Trustees Would Deed Sewer to U. S. as Security

A resolution supplementary to Barrington's application for a public works loan to improve the sewer system, was passed by members of the village board at a special meeting Monday night and forwarded to the federal emergency administration of the public works.

This resolution was relative to the village territory offered the government and to the plan for paying of the loan principal and interest. The resolution stated that the village offers its money to the federal government to mortgage plant and system with a loan given for commercial and industrial plants. This amount would pay the annual principal installments and 4 per cent interest. It would also provide 50 per cent reserve, according to the resolution.

As further security the village would mortgage to the rate of the people of Barrington the question of whether the village shall pay an additional tax of one cent half mill to pay part for the sewer cost. The resolution would also give the government the right to ask for increased services charge if necessary. This could be done in the event of superior results of Lake or Cook counties.

As an alternate security, the resolution offers insurance of sewer bonds.

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
