**First State Bank
Will Pay Dividend
of Five Per Cent**

A 5 per cent cash dividend to depositors of the First State bank will be paid within the next week, according to H. E. Robertson, deputy cashier, who stated that checks will be mailed out later than February 20. The statement from Mr. Robertson follows:

"Edward J. Barrett, auditor of public accounts, has approved a dividend of 5 per cent to the credit of all general creditors of the First State bank of Barrington. Approximately 1200 depositors will receive checks which are expected to be in the mail not later than February 20.

When the dividend is being paid out of collections from assets and is not a part of an expected RFC loan which should be available within 60 to 90 days. Eighty thousand dollars is being asked from the RFC, which after deductions, should permit an additional distribution of between 15 per cent and 20 per cent.

"This five per cent is being paid in accordance with the plan of William B. O'Donnell, receiver to pay dividends as soon as the cash is on hand. Disbursements have been possible heretofore because it was first necessary to liquidate bills payable in the amount of \$125,000 incurred by the village. The cash on hand preferred claims totalling approximately \$3000 are being paid at this time."

Activity of the Merchants Clearing House association which has converted more than \$3000 of the cash on hand into buying power, has been curtailed until after the 5 per cent cash dividend will be paid. Until after disbursement of the checks, B. A. Schroeder, secretary, will not accept any new deposit assignments. However, those depositors who have assigned their certificates on hand can re-assign them with other merchants.

When the dividend is paid, holders of certificates may exchange them for 50 per cent cash and 50 per cent new certificates at the option of the holder. After the 5 per cent dividend is paid next week, the matter of extending the clearing house will be discussed.

The Merchants Clearing House association can not take further deposit assignments until after February 15, according to a suggestion from the clearing house. In such a short time they have already spent \$225,000. Some of this credit has been turned over two or three times by stores re-assigning their clearing house certificates to other stores in payment for merchandise. After the bank dividend is paid next week, the clearing house will continue to operate on a 5 per cent basis. This will not afford much additional help to the depositors and may prove more of a nuisance to local merchants than the additional business from W. warrants.

It has been suggested that the clearing house take on an additional 500,000 of depositors' assignments. This is a plan meriting serious consideration from the merchants. A 15 per cent dividend will not be paid until after the bank dividend is paid next week, the clearing house will continue to operate on a 5 per cent basis. This will not afford much additional help to the depositors and may prove more of a nuisance to local merchants than the additional business from W. warrants.
