Recondition Kilgobbin Sewers

New Equipment Added to Barrington Laundry

With the addition of a new type of shirt ironer, the Barrington Laundry is now rated as one of the best in the state supplying a town of this size.

The company has installed a bank of compressed air operated steam ironers that are the latest for doing work with a minimum of strain on the shirt. These machines are practically automatic and require no exertion from the operator.

Shirts travel through the machine in four steps and are handled four times. No moving parts go over the surface of the garment thereby reducing wearing effects on the material. These new models are made by the American Laundry company and are similar to those used at the Institute at Joliet.

Reconditioning of drains known as "Kilgobbin" is the last section of the reconditioning of drains.
