Common Snail Supplies Man With Food and Dye

The average man on the street who looks upon snails merely as curiosities does not know that those unobtrusive, sea-footed crawl-ers supply man with food, dye, umbrellas, handkerchiefs and ready-made shoes.

There are dozens of species of snails and their cousins, the slug. They are all vegetarians, subsisting mainly upon the tender parts of plants. Nearly all of our snails prefer moist environments, many, however, living entirely beneath water, either in the river bottom or in quiet pools.

The common garden slug, easily recognizable by the absence of a spiral shell, often does considerable damage to gardens.

Plants Vary in Their Water Consuming Ability

Nature is very much of a sportsman with water in carrying out her ordinary agricultural operations. To produce one pound of alfalfa hay 70 pounds of water are pumped through the plant.

Irrigation engineers call the amount of water, in pounds, required to raise a pound of marketable crop, the transpiration ratio.

Plants vary in their water requirements. Engineers of the Department of Agriculture have found that in areas where 20 inches of water are required to grow a five-ton crop of alfalfa to the acre, it takes 10 inches for corn or beets, 10 inches for potatoes and 9 inches for white beans.

Ancient Caves Painted. Paint was used 200,000 years ago by the Cro-Magnon in decorating the caves of southern Europe.

Points on Deer's Aesthetics While it is generally believed by hunters that the number of points on a deer's antlers indicate the animal's age in years, scientists who have studied the matter dispute this assertion.

It is pointed out that although the older the animal the larger the horns it is not true that an additional point is grown each year. The horns are shed in early spring or late winter, the new set beginning to grow immediately.—Detroit News.

"The Fisherman's Blessing" For about 700 years the pope of the Roman Catholic church has worn "The Fisherman's Blessing" as a symbol of his papal authority.

It is named in honor of St. Peter and a little plaque in his center shows an image of him throwing a net from a boat as he once did as a fisherman on the Sea of Galilee. A new ring is made for each pope and broken when he dies.—Catholic Weekly.

State Bank Report Suggests Initiating 30 Pct. Dividend

Time of Payment Depends Federal RFC Loan to Receiver

If the receiver's application for a loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation is granted without too heavy a cash amount asked, the bank will have a 30 per cent dividend on the loan, according to a receipt estimate published recently in the Chicago Tribune.

Following is the statement: "Receipts 1202,000 (\$17,000 last quarter). Used \$125,000 in preferred claims. Spent \$1,000 to protect assets. Returned \$1,000 from the sale of the bank's real estate holdings. From \$3,000 to \$14,000 last quarter, \$7,000 being from the loan record—only \$2,245 net to the bank.

Receipts 1202,000 (\$17,000 last quarter). Used \$125,000 in preferred claims. Spent \$1,000 to protect assets. Returned \$1,000 from the sale of the bank's real estate holdings.
