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Will Investigate Need of Sidewalk Completion

Village Board May Recommend Statute to Put Jobs Through

The problem of concrete sidewalks in sections of the village where incomplete sidewalks have been left in front of one or two vacant lots was a topic of consideration at a regular meeting of the village officials Monday night. The board was responsive to complaints from citizens' sidewalks where they were not in great need.

The main difficulty as brought forth at the meeting seems to gettin' all property owners concerned with a strip of sidewalk to agree to laying it. An investigation of the practicality of various possible sidewalk projects will be undertaken by the village committee. It said it would like to see the committee will attempt to determine in which instances the demand is sufficient for the installation of the sidewalk. A recommendation to act on the matter will be presented to C. Cadwallader, chairman of the committee, at the next meeting of the board, February 11.

Mentions Statute

Attorney David H. Maloney formed the board that has a statute which compels a property owner to construct a walk with the ruling has been made without cost to the owner. He said he would need to review the details of the statute but believed that a title of the peace may be the situation of a limited time define the property owner or person on his property when falls to comply with a sidewalk ruling. The possibility of laying sidewalks by spreading a revenue assessment was discussed, though this method has not been used in Barrington.

Three streets with incomplete sidewalks were mentioned at the meeting: West side of North street, from the railroad crossing, Liberty street, north side of Hillside avenue from Hough street, Grove avenue and east side Summit street. Hillside avenue to a point several hundred feet north.

It was pointed out at the meeting Monday that there are no places in the village where the sense of sidewalks is not only convenient but also dangerous pedestrians. In certain instances persons have been experiencing inconvenience in mail delivery for mailmen are not compelled to deliver beyond the termination of a sidewalk.

Hears Bills Discussed at Library Conference

Miss Olive Dobson, local librarian, attended the Illinois regional library conference at Highland Park public library Monday.

The matter of child literature discussed at this meeting was that of three bills to be introduced into the state legislature by the Illinois Library association.

The bills are as follows:

A bill for an act making provision for the relief and of free tax supported public libraries. The bill provides for appropriation of \$100,000 for purposes of purchasing books and materials for the free tax supported public libraries of Illinois.

A bill for an act making appropriation to the Secretary of State for the Library Extension division of the state library further extending and maintaining library service to all parts of the state now without such service. This bill asks for an appropriation of the sum of \$1,000,000 for the purpose of further extending and maintaining a system of library service for all parts of Illinois living in rural and ham communities that do not have free public libraries to and that they may enjoy a opportunity to secure through books the wholesome recreation and stimulation for their intellectual education. With the passing of this bill all persons living in the state of Illinois would be permitted to take books from any public library free of charge.

A bill for an act to provide the certification of librarians the free public libraries of Illinois in whole or part by taxation.

The appropriations asked in the library bills are to be paid out of the general revenue and do not require an additional tax.
