That is why your federal government at Washington

That is why your federal government at Washington, under the crusading zeal of under secretary of agriculture Dr. Rexford Guy Tugwell, seeks to take a hand in the contemporary merchandising and advertising worlds, and wants to regulate them with a bureaucracy.

We agree with Dr. Tugwell, with the bureau of standards, and with the pure food and drug departments that the American consumer is "gypped" in some of his purchases; trick brand names are created; deceptive sizes of canned and bottled goods are placed on the market; and many other commodities are sold through the subtle artwell sales deception. But the placing of every farm and industrial product in the hands of a Washington bureaucracy is not going to solve the consumers' problem.

We join with many others who are unalterably opposed to the microscopic control of human activity from a central bureaucracy. Such a plan as Dr. Tugwell would like to develop is unworkable—even though some of it may be commendable from a theoretical viewpoint.
