

Advisory Group Submits Report on Sewer System

It is evident that it can be of help by making the following suggestions: It is the opinion of the advisory group of the supreme court of Illinois, which enjoins the village from dumping any effluent from its sewage treatment plant into Flint creek, has made the construction of some kind of a new sewer system absolutely necessary. Whether the board of trustees has selected the best sewer plan to correct this situation and has also chosen the best method to finance it, is something which this committee cannot tell, nor should it be expected to tell in such a short time as has been allowed to the committee to act in deciding upon:

- (a) the best sewer plan from an engineering standpoint and, if the board will have to rely upon its own judgment in the placement of the engineers and the legal counsel that it has employed.
- (b) the best plan to finance it, the board will have to rely upon its own judgment in the placement of the engineers and the legal counsel that it has employed.

It is also pointed out that the village must acquire flowage rights. The decision of the supreme court makes it absolutely necessary and the same has been pointed out by:

- (a) The state sanitary water board which demands flowage rights before a permit will be given, and
 - (b) The PWA demands the same before it will grant the loan.
- Therefore, the committee feels that there should be no further delay on the part of the village in acquiring the flowage rights to the creek.

2. THE ENGINEERING PLAN OF THE NEW SEWER SYSTEM MUST TAKE CARE OF THE FOLLOWING:

- (A) It should comply with the decision of the supreme court so that no further litigation will arise.
- (B) It should comply with all requirements of the state authority.
- (C) It should be COMPLETE AND FINAL, both as to treatment and disposal of the sewage, except for such extensions as may be necessary for an increase in population.
- (D) It should take care of ALL property owners affected by the new improvement.

3. THE FINANCIAL PLAN OF THE NEW SEWER SYSTEM MUST TAKE CARE OF THE FOLLOWING:

- (A) It should be the least expensive to the property owners, an absolute necessity.
- (B) It should take into consideration and provide for an adequate amount for the payment of additional expenses by those property owners who are not being benefited by the sewer plant but who have not been assessed for its payment.
- (C) It should provide for a settlement of the controversy over the pump and the so-called Giesfeld sewer.
- (D) It should be definite enough so that each property owner will know whether the cost will be paid, or whether he will have additional expense for connecting into the new sewer or disconnecting house drains, etc., etc.

intence, and the committee now understands from the letters from the PWA that a PWA loan of \$1,000,000 annual rental charge of approximately \$17.00 per year per sewer connection, based on 1000 sewer connections for 20 years. There is no definite assurance that there would be any such number of connections. Therefore, the charge per connection might easily be considerably more than \$17.00.

It has been stated that the \$17.00 charge would be reduced as the population or number of sewer connections increased, but there is no definite assurance that this would be true. Conversely—might there not be a possibility that this charge might be increased if some day it did not pay? Whereas, under a special assessment, each property owner would know definitely the cost for his own property and all property benefited would show it on his tax bill.

The committee is unable, therefore, to recommend either plan, or the advantage of a PWA loan over special assessment. However, the committee does recommend that the board should get a complete report in writing from the engineers and the legal counsel, showing a comparison of costs under the two plans and the advantage, if any, of one over the other.

The committee also wishes to point out that while it may be true that there is under the PWA loan, a "grant" of 50 per cent of the cost of material and labor, to the municipality, this does not mean that the village should not pay for the material and labor. Bonding Power

The PWA letters also mention the possibility of issuing \$250,000 additional security. The committee feels that the bonding power should not be used for this purpose but should be kept in reserve for acquiring flowage rights to the creek and to pay off the present existing debts of the village.

Engineering and Legal Counsel

The committee has taken notice of the present articles in connection with reference to the obligations that the village has already incurred to the engineering and legal counsel. The committee has examined the contracts in question and the opinion of the committee is that these contracts are not entirely fair to the village, for the following reasons:

- (1) The contract with the engineer seems to give them an "indefinite right" to the job whenever it goes through. The committee feels that no board should enter into any contract that will have the effect of binding, or where they will have additional expense for connecting into the new sewer or disconnecting house drains, etc., etc.
- (2) The contract with the attorney seems to give them a large fee of approximately \$1,000 if the loan is granted after approval of the project. The balance of the fee will be paid if the village fails to award a contract for the improvement within six months after the date of approval of the project. The VILLAGE may later decide to finance the project by a special assessment or in some other way. The committee feels that this is a large fee and the contract should provide for an agreement more equitable to the village.

"Motorcycle Castles," news and comedy complete the program.

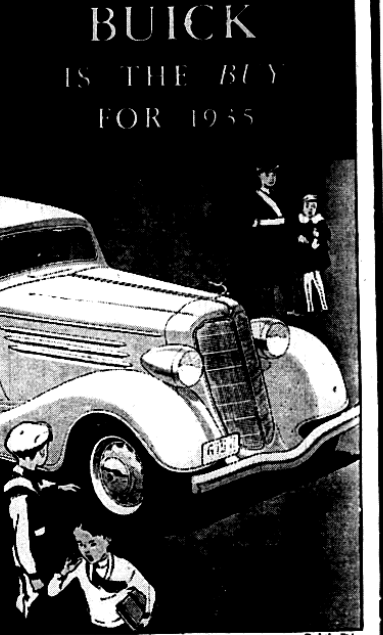
