Kelsey Charges Excessive Waste in State Relief

Cuba-Supervisor Represents State Group Before General Assembly

The administration costs of distributing Illinois Emergency relief benefits in Cuba township sometimes totals as high as \$100 per month and is excessive greater than the administration costs of poor relief under the system. H. D. Kelsey of Barrington declared in testifying before a joint session of the general assembly at Springfield Tuesday.

Mr. Kelsey, chairman of the Lake county board of supervisors, and James Cannell of Rockford, supervisor in Winnebago county, were selected by the county supervisors of the state to represent them in a campaign to reduce the cost of IER administration by eliminating waste and graft. The supervisors met at Springfield February 13 to crystallize their campaign. At that meeting they elected Mr. Kelsey and Mr. Cannell as a committee to investigate the cause of the waste in the relief program. Mr. Kelsey delivered pointed addresses at the joint session Tuesday.

Mr. Kelsey told the legislators that just west of school yard, he had a pile of \$125 a month to administer the relief. He said the girls were entirely uneducated in the matter and could not possibly understand the needs of destitute families as well as administer the relief needs as efficiently as could married men and women.

Administration of relief is a matter of getting necessities of life to destitute persons and not a matter of great high salaries for men and women to do the work, he said. In this connection Mr. Kelsey said that in some districts of the state, notably Chicago relief officials get as high as \$500 per month salaries, which represents a deep pocket in the funds which could be spent for the necessities of life for poor and destitute families.

In Lake county the poor relief was formerly administered by the town supervisors at a cost of \$15 per month, which is small compared to the \$400 and more per month now spent.

The IER in many cases has done regarding the Bogardis act and has created needy war veterans and paupers. Mr. Kelsey told the members of the assembly that he would like to see the legislators investigate the organization, eliminate waste and graft and bring the benefits from it to the families needing it.
