It is obvious that these indirect taxes—which provide the bulk of the governmental revenue—fall more heavily on persons of moderate means than on those with higher incomes. A loaf of bread will last a millionaire as long as it will a labore—and the tax is the same on the loaf each buys.

Tax reduction would be the greatest boon the average American could have—a boon that would at once be reflected in more jobs, more purchasing power, more spending for the necessities and luxuries which keep the industrial machine turning.—Register, Storm Lake, Iowa.
