

### Maloney Requested to Seek Approval of PWA Sewer Loan

The population of the village of Barrington at that time exceeded three thousand people, and now exceeds thirty-five hundred. This estimate of capacity of the plant was based on sanitary sewage only. In addition to the sanitary sewage, the plant was required to handle the storm water sewage. When completed, the present plan was, therefore, totally inadequate to handle the combined sanitary and storm water sewage. The sewerage was in part, due to the option of the engineer that the size of the sewer is still subject to change for the purpose of handling the storm water sewage. In order to relieve the plant of the excess raw sewage at the plant, the plan was amended to include the storm water sewage. **Separation of Sewage Planned**  
In 1929, the village board recognized the necessity of separating the sanitary and storm water sewage, and instituted a proceeding for a new sewerage system. The board decided to separate a large part of the storm water from the sanitary sewage. This was generally known as the "outlet" system of sewers which included also the enlargement of the treatment plant. This project was abandoned with the collapse of the real estate market. The sewerage system was designed to handle the sanitary sewage only, and the storm water sewage was not included in the original plan.

**Improvement Proposed**  
When going into details of construction of the present project, it is necessary to refer to the storm water from the sanitary sewage. In converting a portion of the present system into a storm water sewage system, it is necessary to separate the sanitary sewage from the storm water sewage. This enables not only economical treatment of the sanitary sewage, but also a higher order of purity of effluent and in the long run, provides a safer and much less expensive method of disposition of the effluent.

**Plan for Sewerage System**  
The plan also contemplates the construction of a separate sewerage system for the area now being served by the present sewerage system. 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sewer revenue bonds. Since the objection of the report by the civic advisory committee, there seems to be considerable uncertainty and absence of adequate information concerning sewer revenue bonds. It is not convenient or practical in this letter to discuss the comparative merits between the sewerage revenue financing and the special assessment financing and this will be discussed in a separate report. However, it is desirable that a clear understanding be had of the sewerage revenue financing.

**Special Session of the State Legislature**  
At a special session of the state legislature in the year 1932, a sewer revenue bill was passed. Prior to this time, the state law of Illinois did not recognize the right to issue bonds to provide for sewerage improvement including plant and sewer facilities. In order to come within the class of projects which the PWA would recognize, a bill was introduced at the special session of the legislature, providing for the issuance of sewer revenue bonds. The purpose of the act is to provide a method of financing sewerage improvements based upon a charge for a service rendered. The charge to be for sewer service rather than a benefit from an improvement. The act provides for the issuance of bonds at such a rate of interest as may be determined by the village not exceeding six (6) per cent. The bonds mature in ten (10) years, but not exceeding forty (40) years. The act further requires that bonds may be sold at such a price as will not cost the municipality in excess of six (6) per cent per annum computed to maturity according to the standard table of bond values.

### Girl Scout Troop Reorganizes; 27 Members Present

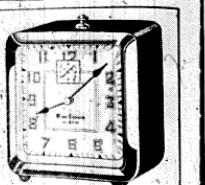
