Few Candidates File for Local Elective Offices

Interest Lacking in Campaigns for Village and Town Elections

Holding public office in the community is not such a popular pastime as it was a year and more previously, according to the comparatively small number of persons filing nomination petitions for various offices which are to be filled by election this spring.

This lack of interest is apparent in town, village and park district campaigns. In the village and park district, the end of the filing period has not been reached.

For the first time in the history of municipal elections in Illinois, full boards of village trustees are to be elected at one time. This means that the six candidates for trustees receiving the highest number of votes will be elected, and that makes the job of getting slabs of votes in three years past when only three high candidates for trustees were elected. To most observers this would seem to be an incentive for more candidates to enter the race for election.

The terms of six-acting trustees expire by the end of the terms of only three have expired at one time in the past. This fact makes possible the entry of three extra candidates for election.

Regardless of these facts only six men have filed their petitions for nomination for the six trusteeships. Only one man has filed papers for the office of president and only one man has filed for clerk. This is a total of one candidate for each job. However, three additional persons have taken out nomination blanks and probably will file them before next Tuesday evening, the deadline.

One of these three is probably a candidate for clerk, the other two are candidates for either president or trustee. The candidates are:

For president—Earl Hart, clerk—Arthur C. Durand; for trustees—Rudolph Kocher (the last to file) John Carroll, John Blanks, Vernon Schneider, John Dueschler and D. A. Grebe.

The three candidates whose petitions have been taken out but not filed are J. C. Candelario, Ed Langendorf and Elden Gieske.

In Cuba town five men have filed their papers for road commissioner. At the last election, three years ago seven men were candidates.

In Elia township only two men are competing for the office of trustee. In Barrington township only one man is a candidate for school trustee and one candidate appeared for the office of justice of the peace.

Improvement is completed. In the above computation and for the purpose of this comparison of the methods of financing, we do not include the four (\$5) dollars in our calculations in determining the cost of this improvement by sewage reversion financing, because under special assessment financing this same cost would have to be met by taxation in the same manner as I propose that the village should do under sewage reversion financing. Therefore, we are justified in making our calculations on the basis of approximately thirteen (\$13) dollars, service charge with an additional cost per user of approximately (\$9) dollars.
