*Witnesses of Gun Battle to Appear at Trial of Chase*

The opinion of John Paul Chase, companion of Lester Gillis (Baby Face Nelson) was set for trial in Chicago Monday with Judge Philip L. Sullivan presiding.

Several Barrington persons, who witnessed the gun battle near North Side park November 27 may be called to Chicago as witnesses. The local persons who viewed the battle from the nearest vantage points were Mrs. Frances Kramer, Harold Kramer, H. E. Cooper and Mrs. William Meister.

Nelson and a companion believed to be Chase engaged in a machine gun, rifle and shotgun battle with St. P. Cowley and H. E. Hollis, federal agents, on the Northwest highway at the entrance to North Side park following the automobile chase said to have started near Lake Geneva. Nelson and the two agents died as the result of wounds received in the battle. Later Chase was arrested in California as a companion in the battle. He was charged with murder of Hollis and Cowley.

*Members of School Board Candidates for Offices Again*

Interest in the school election, April 15, developed this week when petitions for nomination of two members and the president of the board were filed in circulation among friends of the candidates.
