Air Conditioning System
Is Being Installed in Offices of Jewel Plant

An extensive air conditioning system is being installed in the Jewel Tea company building. The offices and auditorium on the fifth floor and the cafeteria on the sixth floor will be cooled by this new equipment.

A 132-foot well was drilled last week to supply water for the system. A flow of 700 gallons a minute was reported last Friday, a volume of water that is considered large for a 132-foot well in this locality. A 65,000 gallon reservoir is now under construction.

The system will probably be functioning about April 15.

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Lake County Opens Suits to Collect Town Obligations

The first of a series of suits that will be brought against the 18 towns of Lake county to collect some \$100,000 that is owed by the towns to the county was filed by State's Attorney Charles E. Mason last Friday.

The money is owed for the maintenance of the county poor farm at Libertyville and the county hospital at Waukegan.

Deerfield was the first town against which a suit was filed in circuit court by the state's attorney. A \$24,191.02 judgment was asked for past-due bills owed by the county.

Cuba town, which owes the county one of the smallest amounts of any of the Lake county units, has made an agreement to pay its obligation, and thus eliminating the possibility of a suit being brought by the state's attorney, according to H. D. Kelsey, chairman of county board. The town is now in a position to pay one-half of the obligation, and official authority will probably be given to pay at the town meeting, April 2, he said. It is understood that certain other districts are preparing similar action to pay their obligations prior to the coming town election.

Twelve have been liable for part of the expenses of the county farm and county hospital under legislation enacted in the general assembly on June 29, 1931.

Several of the towns have been paying their current bills on up-keep and maintenance of the county hospital and county farm but have failed to discharge those obligations that accrued immediately following passage of the legislation in Spring, 1931.

Attaches of the state's attorney's office stated Saturday that another separate suit is being drawn to collect delinquent bills from Waukegan town which are reported to present to be in excess of \$100,000.

Individual bills are to be drawn next week on each one of the 18 Lake county towns to collect past-due obligations.

Bills have accrued in the various towns which have sent patients either to the county farm or county hospital for care and treatment.
