Chase Gets Life Imprisonment for Murder of Cowley

Gunnman Guilty of Killing Here; Jury Recommends Leniency

John Paul Chase, who has given Barrington world-wide notoriety, was found guilty of murder and sentenced to life imprisonment last Monday night in the court of Federal Judge Sullivan. Sentence was passed on Chase for the death of federal agent Samuel P. Cowley, mortally wounded in a gun battle between federal agents Cowley and Harry Holtz and Chase, one of his companions, "Bibby Page Nelson," on the Northwest highway at Northside park entrance in Barrington last November. Several local persons were called as witnesses.

The case went to the jury at 4 p. m. The jury studied the facts of Chase for only four hours, twice asking for more instructions from Judge Sullivan. Shortly before 4 o'clock the body was taken to the judge asking further information but the request was refused.

The juror later asked for more information declaring that they wished to know whether a life imprisonment would mean that Chase would be incarcerated for the whole of his natural life. The jury and the defendant were brought into court and Judge Sullivan explained that Chase would pass out of his jurisdiction after sentence had passed and then would be under the jurisdiction of the federal parole board and the president of the United States. The jurors then retired and at 8 o'clock came back into court with a verdict of "guilty with recommendation for mercy" which makes the sentence of life imprisonment mandatory. If the verdict had not carried the recommendation for mercy the mandatory sentence would be death.
