Drop Suit Against Hendee; Levy \$4500 for Poor in Cuba

Annual Cuba Town Meeting Held at Polling Place Tuesday

Payment of debts claimed by the county hospital and poor farm and dropping of the suit against Low Hendee, county clerk, were highlights of this year's annual town meeting of Cuba, held at the polling place at 2 p. m. Tuesday. It was voted to levy \$4500 for the poor fund.

Supervisor Harold Kelsey opened the meeting with reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, which were approved as read. Following that the financial statement of expenditures in various town funds was read by Clerk Andrew Grom.

Mr. Kelsey stated that he intended to pay debts claimed by the county hospital and poor farm although the suits started by those organizations have not been settled.

A letter sent by the Illinois emergency relief commission of Lake County was discussed in relation to the assessing of the annual poor fund. The commission asked that \$6300 be assigned to the fund. It was decided that the relief commission spent \$17,000 in Cuba township last year, money from the state and federal governments being used for it.

After some discussion a sum of \$4500 was agreed upon as the limit that the township could meet. Last year the levy amounted to \$700.

Due to the fact that there is no gravel tax this year the increase in the poor fund will be taken care of money which previously went for gravel, leaving the tax rate the same as formerly. Verne Hobbs, township clerk, collector, addressed the meeting in regard to law suits against county clerk Low Hendee. Mr. Hobbs stated that he is going to drop action because there can be no settlement brought them according to law in the statute it is stipulated that the collector is to be paid in ten days from December 1st until February 1st and as the time limit is now past, legal action would be of no avail.

Money to be used for the Barrington Aid fund could not be definitely settled upon so it was agreed that a sum of \$2000 to \$1000 be given for that until Mr. Kelsey could meet with the American Legion and learn its wishes in the matter. It was agreed that two or three hundred dollars would be needed.

A reduction in the town fund was next voted at \$2000, a decrease from last year of \$500. Donations of \$25 each were voted to be given to Woman's Relief corp and the Ladies Auxiliary.

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
