Dairy Firm Fined for Violation of Local Ordinance

Arrest Follows When Agent Is Found Soliciting at Homes

The village of Barrington tried its first case for violation of the soliciting ordinance Saturday afternoon in the office of A. L. Church, Justice of the peace against John Wiel, salesman for the Lamprecht Butter and Egg Co. of Milwaukee.

Mr. Wiel was arrested by Chief of Police Hanko at the residence of John Blanke, 533 Summit street, April 4 as he was in the act of making a direct solicitation for Mr. Blanke to sample his merchandise.

E. Elmers, branch manager, represented the Lamprecht firm at the trial and pleaded guilty to the charge.

The Police Magistrate Church set the fine at \$25, the minimum for such an offense, with the stipulation that if no soliciting is done in the village for the next 90 days he would remit \$20 of the fine.

The case held the first violation of the village law for the purpose of collecting money but wishes to have the ordinance strictly enforced.

As this was the first time the company had been in error and having received a promise that there would be no second violation he made the order of remittance.

Lamprecht Co. delivers in the village on direct invitation of the customers whereby the authorities have no power to act on these cases but the soliciting ordinance passed in December of 1933 states that no soliciting may be done.

It was hoped that the case would be contested as officials are desirous to know what legal power the ordinance has. Legislation on soliciting and advertising is done for the welfare of local merchants to protect them from outside interests.
