Melvin Harder, 11, Fatally Injured in Fencing Bout

Melvin Harder, 11-year-old son and only child of Mr. and Mrs. George Harder of Deerfield and Whitehorn of Barrington died at the Highland Park hospital Tuesday morning following a tragic accident while at play.

The boy was fatally injured while playing at fencing with his father. The pole of Melvin's opponent pierced Melvin's face just above the right eye ball.

The injured child fell backwards while on the ground and injuring his skull. He was taken to the Highland Park hospital Tuesday by Dr. Whitcomb of Barrington who had been visiting at the Harder home.

The little fellow was paralyzed on his left side from the first and never regained consciousness.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at the Grand Central church in Deerfield. The Harder family are well known in Barrington because of their frequent visits at the Whitcomb home.
