**Illinois State Police to Get Police Radio System**

Plans for the establishment of a state police radio system, urged as a means for improving law enforcement, are nearing completion. L. M. Taylor, chief of state highway police, has reported.

Approximately one-quarter million dollars for the construction of the system has been included in the budget for the division of highways, Taylor said.

Taylor has conferred with Frank Hafferty, chief radio engineer for the past several months on contractual details of the system.

Tenative plans call for seven transmitting stations to be located so that every part of the state will come within the range of the broadcasts. Definite selection of the sites for the location of the stations has not been made, Taylor said.

Tests are being conducted to determine the type of receivers to be installed in patrol cars and motorcycles.

Contracts for the land and buildings for the transmitters and towers also have been decided upon.

Barrington Bird Club and Junior High Grades Make Gifts

A sum of about \$300 set aside by the Barrington Garden Club to be used for landscaping work around the swimming pool at North Side park, is being used to beautify the grounds. The work was started under the direction of Henry Melow, chairman of the club.

Plans show homes of evergreen barberry on the west side of the bathhouse. A gravel walk covered with white crushed stone is to lead from the parking space to the front of the building where the proposed croquet courts are to be installed. It will lead to connect with a slab stone walk leading to the recreation field. A hedge will line both sides of the walk.

Evergreen shrubs are to be planted at the corners of the bathhouse and evergreen shade trees on the west side of the recreation field. Flowering shrubs will be included as details of the landscaping.

Pupils Plant Trees

Arbor Day was observed by pupils of the sixth, seventh and eighth grades of Junior high school at North Side park Friday afternoon when three trees were planted by a Chinese.

Further landscaping is being directed by park commissioners and filling of the pool will be the final step in preparation for Barrington's new beauty and recreational center.
