Tyrell Withdraws From Lake County Sheriff Contest

Lake county sheriff, Lawrence Doolittle, now holds office without further litigation due to steps taken by Attorney George Field, representing Bart Tyrell, Tuesday. Attorney Field appeared before Judge Perry L. Persons and asked permission to withdraw Mr. Tyrell's petition for a recount. Judge Persons granted the request and entered an order permitting the petition to be withdrawn.

After 30 days of counting and checking of ballots and a week spent in court proceedings to discuss ballots under question, Tyrell was accounted as loser by 72 votes. Judge Persons granted further time for counsel to present any proof or testimony to uphold allegations of irregularities in the election.

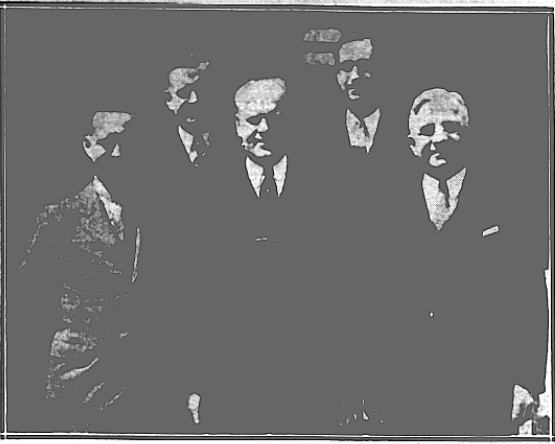
Attorney Field appeared Tuesday with a motion to withdraw the petition for recount. This motion has been accepted as a meaning that no proof or testimony could be offered in court by counsel for the plaintiff.

Although the recount fades from the picture another issue into view between Russ Alford and County Clerk Lew Hendee as the outcome of court proceedings are awaited. Ballot cast in November's election will again be used as there are two petitions for recount on file at the county clerk's office. Both the republican and democratic candidates have filed notice that they wish a recount in the event matters now under court ruling prove unfavorable.

There is pending in court now a mandamus action to force Hendee to issue a certificate of election to Alford. Hendee refused to do so on the grounds that Alford did not receive a majority of votes. Hendee has until May 15 to appeal the case to the supreme court after having been refused a rehearing in the Appellate court of an appeal from Judge Ralph Dady's court.

New Headquarters for Brandt Dairy Will Open Friday



Brandt Dairy Co. will start operating its new pasteurizing plant Friday. The building is located on James street and has been re-modeled and painted throughout the interior with aluminum paint.

Mr. Brandt has installed a modern pasteurization plant and complete bottling machine. A cooling system that insures constant even temperature has been installed in a refrigerating box.

Daily output of milk is estimated to be 2000 quarts with provisions to increase that amount by adding additional machinery. All machinery used in the process of handling milk is sealed thereby insuring that milk passing through the dairy will not be touched by human hands.

An "open house" is to be held in a week or two to afford customers of the dairy an opportunity to inspect the new quarters and to learn how milk is cared for from the raw product to bottled goods. An announcement of the open house will be made later.
