Joseph Klusace Killed by Train Sunday Afternoon

Funeral Services Held Monday; Burial at St. Adelbert's

A verdict of accidental was returned by a coroner's Monday investigating the death of Joseph Klusace which occurred Sunday afternoon at 4:40 on the Chicago. Klusace was riding tracks about 1 1/2 miles east of the depot.

Mr. Klusace was struck by a train as he stepped out upon tracks to get a newspaper. Witnesses thought and not the train.

Locomotive engineer C. Madden of Harvard, Ill., testified at the inquest, which was held at the funeral chapel 202 S. 3rd street that he sounded the alarm whistle when he saw Klusace step into the path of the train. It had just pulled out of the depot going toward Chicago and was traveling about 25 miles per hour, he said. He brought to a stop shortly after it struck Klusace.

Mr. Klusace had gone out on a walk with a neighbor's dog as was his custom had walked through the fields enjoying the view, going east toward Riverton. Exactly how the death occurred could not be determined.

Funeral services were held Wednesday morning at the chapel and also at St. Anne's church in the city. Burial was in St. Adelbert's church in Niles. Rev. John J. Wetton conducted the services.

Joseph J. Klusace was in Chicago in 1878, married in 1882, and came to the country with his bride in 1891. They moved to Barrington seven years ago and made their home at 127 E. Hillside avenue.

Mr. Klusace had operated a commission brokerage house fruits and vegetable in Chicago for the last 15 years.

He is survived by his wife, Marie, one son, Joseph, a daughter, Mrs. Francis Masdyk, two grandchildren, a brother and several sisters.

John Kjellander Dies Sunday; Rites by Masonic Order

Masonic funeral services were held Wednesday for John Kjellander, 72 of Lake Zurich in Chicago, 1932, who came to this country with his bride in 1863. He had been ill for several years.

Mr. Kjellander died at home in Lake Zurich Sunday evening. He had been ill for the last two years. He was born in Skillinge, Sweden in 1863 and had made his home in Lake Zurich for the last 15 years.

Mr. Kjellander served as an alderman from 1912 to 1916 in the 23rd ward in Chicago and as a clerk of the Superior court in Chicago from 1910 to 1912. He was one of the first to give testimony in the prohibition administration of the district. He had been an alderman of the Winland-Kjellander Ice Cream Company in Chicago for several years.

He is survived by his wife, Esther, and a niece, Mrs. A. P. Lacroix, of Barrington.
