

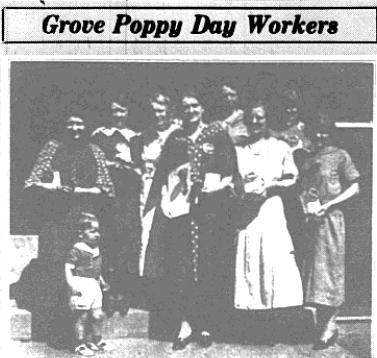
**Margaret Strnad, Mildred Krizan Win Contest at Grove**
