Quarantine Period for Scarlet Fever Is Four Weeks Now, Was Three

The quarantine period for scarlet fever has been extended to four weeks as the result of a change in statute made by the legislature during the past session. This notice was received by H. D. Kelsey, health officer of Cuba town.

In case of scarlet fever break-

ing out among members of a family on a dairy farm, the milk product may be marketed if outside help, free from exposure to the disease is engaged to operate the dairy. Men in the family can be placed in separate quarantine for a week and if they do not contract the disease, they can operate the dairy thereafter, providing they reside away from the members of the family who are ill.

This ruling was made as the result of efforts by Mr. Kelsey and associates to improve the situation of dairy farmers during an epidemic without endangering the health of others.

Mrs. R. Hammond and Miss Reed Will be in Review Contest

Get Major Prizes! Subscribers Cash Awards to Six Others

After six and one-half weeks of exciting but friendly rivalry, in which a dozen residents of Barrington and nearby municipalities participated, the Barrington Review subscription campaign reached a highly successful conclusion Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. R. Hammond, resident of one-half mile west of the village was high in total number of votes and won a Pontiac and published from Schaubel, Bielschke and Collins and presented the Review.

Miss Margaret Reed of La Grange was second high in number of votes and won the year award for district B, \$473 cash. Mrs. R. G. Piaggio, who voted on the average, followed that of Miss Reed, won second prize which was a substantial award. Mrs. Frank Kirby of third prize, also a cash award. Other winners were: Mrs. Henry Wichman, Miss Blaine Graham, Mrs. J. W. La Grange and Mrs. Angie B. Montgomerie.

All votes for the past week have been placed in a sealed box which was opened in the presence of three impartial and disinterested judges chosen by the candidates at 2 o'clock Saturday. Judge A. Robertson, Karl Schwemmer and Howard Brintlinger counted credits and announced awards. The highest number of votes received by candidates was 100. The votes were obtained by selling subscriptions to the Review and by collecting free copies published in the first issue of the campaign. Following announcement of the contest the campaign was marked unusually good sportsmanship on the part of the candidates. It proved to be a clean, cash selling contest as it was successful, its success was revealed by the fact that nearly every Review reader approached by candidate renewed. He subscribed. Hundreds of persons who had been regular readers previously sided their names to the list. The large percentage of persons residing in Barrington were readers of the Review prior to the campaign, there was no clerical increase in town a marked expansion on the regular route and in the nearby villages. The contest territory had been divided into two districts, including Barrington and surrounding territory of about one mile radius surrounding the village, and "outside of it and nearby villages." The purpose was to encourage expansion into the outlying territory and the plan was successful. The public throughout both districts generously supported the works and The Review.
